### RESOLUTION #17-6 ADOPTION AND/OR READOPTION OF RARAP PLAN

WHEREAS, the Benton County Board of Supervisors has previously adopted Residential Anti-Displacement and Relocation Assistance Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Benton County Board of Supervisors desires to either adopt new policy and/or re-adopt the existing policy; and

WHEREAS, the Benton County Board of Supervisors needs to repeal the current policy to eliminate any potential conflicts between those policies currently in place and those being adopted on this date,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that all policies for Residential Anti-Displacement and Relocation Assistance ARE HEREBY REPEALED effective this date.

IT IS FUTHER RESOLVED by the Benton County Board of Supervisors that the following policy is hereby adopted effective this date:

#### RESIDENTIAL ANTI-DISPLACEMENT AND RELOCATION ASSISTANCE PLAN U

This Residential Anti-displacement and Relocation Assistance Plan (RARAP) is prepared by Benton County, Iowa, in accordance with the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended; and HUD regulations at 24 CFR 42.325 and is applicable to our CDBG, UDAG, and/or HOME-assisted projects.

### Minimize Displacement

Consistent with the goals and objectives of activities assisted under the Act, Benton County will take the following steps to minimize the direct and indirect displacement of persons from their homes that may include the following:

- 1. Coordinate code enforcement with rehabilitation and housing Assistance programs.
- 2. Evaluate housing codes and rehabilitation standards in reinvestment areas to prevent undue financial burden on established owners and tenants.

- 3. Stage rehabilitation of apartment units to allow tenants to remain in the building/complex during and after the rehabilitation, working with empty units first.
- 4. Arrange for facilities to house persons who must be relocated temporarily during rehabilitation.
- 5. Adopt policies to identify and mitigate displacement resulting from intensive public investment in neighborhoods.
- 6. Adopt policies, which provide reasonable protection for tenants faced with conversion to a condominium or cooperative.
- 7. Adopt tax assessment policies, such as deferred tax payment plans, to reduce impact of increasing property tax assessments on lower income owner-occupants or tenants in revitalizing areas.
- 8. Establish counseling centers to provide homeowners and tenants with information on assistance available to help them remain in their neighborhood in the face of revitalization pressures.
- 9. Where feasible, give priority to rehabilitation of housing, as opposed to demolition, to avoid displacement.
- If feasible, demolish or convert only dwelling units that are not occupied or vacant occupiable dwelling units (especially those units which are "lower-income dwelling units" (as defined in 24 CFR 42.305).
- 11. Target only those properties deemed essential to the need or success of the project.

#### **Relocation Assistance to Displaced Persons**

Benton County will provide relocation assistance for lower-income tenants who, in connection with an activity assisted under the CDBG and/or HOME Programs, move permanently or move personal property from real property as a direct result of the demolition of any dwelling unit or the conversion of a lower-income dwelling unit in accordance with the requirements of 24 CFR 42.350. A displaced person who is not a lower-income tenant, will be provided relocation assistance in accordance with the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970, as amended, and implementing regulations at 49 CFR Part 24.

#### **One-for-One Replacement of Lower-Income Dwelling Units**

Benton County will replace all occupied and vacant occupiable lower-income dwelling units demolished or converted to a use other than lower-income housing in connection with a project assisted with funds provided under the CDBG and/or HOME Programs in accordance with 24 CFR 42.375.

Before entering into a contract committing Benton County to provide funds for a project that will directly result in demolition or conversion of lower-income dwelling units, Benton County will make public by publication in a newspaper of general circulation and submit to the Iowa Economic Development Authority the following information in writing:

- 1. A description of the proposed assisted project;
- 2. The address, number of bedrooms, and location on a map of lower-income dwelling units that will be demolished or converted to a use other than as lower-income dwelling units as a result of an assisted project;
- 3. A time schedule for the commencement and completion of the demolition or conversion;
- 4. To the extent known, the address, number of lower-income dwelling units by size (number of bedrooms) and location on a map of the replacement lower-income housing that has been or will be provided. NOTE: See also 24 CFR 42.375(d).
- 5. The source of funding and a time schedule for the provision of the replacement dwelling units;
- 6. The basis for concluding that the replacement dwelling unit will remain a lower-income dwelling unit for at least 10 years from the date of initial occupancy; and
- 7. Information demonstrating that any proposed replacement of lower-income dwelling units with smaller dwelling units (e.g., a 2-bedroom unit with two 1-bedroom units), or any proposed replacement of efficiency or single-room

occupancy (SRO) units with units of a different size, is appropriate and consistent with the housing needs and priorities identified in the HUD-approved State Consolidated Plan and 24 CFR 42.375(b).

To the extent that the specific location of the replacement dwelling units and other data in items 4 through 7 are not available at the time of the general submission, the County will identify the general location of such dwelling units on a map and complete the disclosure and submission requirements as soon as the specific data is available.

#### **Replacement not Required Based on Unit Availability**

Under 24 CFR 42.375(d), Benton County may submit a request to the Iowa Economic Development Authority for a determination that the one-for-one replacement requirement does not apply based on objective data that there is an adequate supply of vacant lower-income dwelling units in standard condition available on a non-discriminatory basis within the area.

WHEREAS, the Benton County Board of Supervisors has previously adopted a Procurement Policy with said adoptions being at various times; and

WHEREAS, the Benton County Board of Supervisors desires to adopt new policy; and

WHEREAS, the Benton County Board of Supervisors needs to repeal the current policy to eliminate any potential conflicts between those policies currently in place and those being adopted on this date,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Procurement Policy IS HEREBY REPEALED effective this date.

IT IS FUTHER RESOLVED by the Benton County Board of Supervisors that the following policy is hereby adopted effective this date:

### PROCUREMENT POLICY

This Procurement Policy of Benton County (hereinafter referenced as "<u>Recipient</u>") is applied with respect to funding assistance awarded from the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), by the Iowa Economic Development Authority (IEDA), as specified in 2 CFR Part 200.317 - 200.326

### PURPOSE

The purpose of this Procurement Policy is to ensure that sound business judgment is utilized in all procurement transactions and that supplies, equipment, construction, and services are obtained efficiently and economically and in compliance with applicable federal law and executive orders and to ensure that all procurement transactions will be conducted in a manner that provides full and open competition.

### **APPLICATION**

This policy applies to the procurement of all supplies, equipment, construction, and services of and for the <u>Recipient</u> as related to the implementation and administration of CDBG Program award. All procurement will be done in accordance with 2CFR Part 200 and Appendix II to Part 200, or as may be amended.

#### POLICY

GENERAL PROCUREMENT PRACTICES

<u>Recipient</u> will adhere to the following general procurement practices: document procurement standards; maintain oversight of contractors to ensure performance in accord with standards; avoid acquisition of unnecessary of duplicative items; encourage procurement or use of shared goods and services; use Federal excess and surplus property when feasible; encourage value-engineering clauses in construction contracts; award contracts only to responsible contractors; limit use of time and materials contracting; and use good administrative judgment to settle all contractual and administrative issues.

#### COMPETITION

<u>Recipient</u> will provide full and open competition; prohibit use of state or local geographical preferences; develop written procedures for procurement transactions to ensure competition is not restricted; and ensure that pre-qualified lists are current.

### METHODS OF PROCUREMENT

Procurement under grants shall be made by one of the following methods, as described herein: (a) micro-purchase; (b) small purchase procedures; (c) sealed bids (formal advertising); (d) competitive proposals; (e) noncompetitive proposals.

- A. Micro-purchase includes the acquisition of supplies or services that do not exceed \$3,000 (or \$2,000 for acquisitions for construction subject to Davis-Bacon Act)
- B. Small purchase procedures are relatively simple and informal procurement methods that are sound and appropriate for the procurement of services, supplies, or other property, costing in aggregate not more than \$150,000. If small purchase procedures are used for a procurement under a grant, price or rate quotations (minimum of 2) shall be obtained from an adequate number of qualified sources.
- C. In sealed bids (formal advertising), sealed bids are publicly solicited and a firm-fixed-price contract (lump sum or unit price) is awarded to the responsible bidder whose bid, conforming with all of the material terms and conditions of the invitation for bids, is the lowest in price. The sealed bids method is the required method for procuring construction.
  - 1. In order for formal advertising to be feasible, appropriate conditions must be present, including, at a minimum, the following:
    - a) A complete, adequate and realistic specification or purchase description is available.
    - b) Two or more responsible bidders are willing and able to compete effectively for Recipient's business; and
    - c) The procurement lends itself to a firm-fixed-price contract, and the selection of the successful bidder can be made principally on the basis of price.
  - 2. When sealed bids are used for a procurement under a grant, the following requirements apply:
  - 3.
- a) A sufficient time prior to the date set for opening of bids, bids shall be solicited (publicly advertised) from an adequate number of known suppliers.
- b) The invitation for bids, including specifications and pertinent attachments, shall clearly define the items or services needed in order for the bidders to properly respond to the invitation for bids.
- c) All bids shall be opened publicly at the time and place stated in the invitation for bids.
- d) A firm-fixed-price contract award shall be made by written notice to that responsible bidder whose bid, conforming to the invitation for bids, is lowest. Where specified in the bidding documents, factors such as discounts, transportation costs, and life cycle costs shall be considered in determining which bid is lowest. Payment discounts may only be used to determine low bid when prior experience of <u>Recipient</u> indicates that such discounts are generally taken.
- e) Any or all bids may be rejected if there are sound documented business reasons in the best interest of the program.
- D. Procurement by competitive proposals is normally conducted with more than one source submitting an offer, and either a fixed-price or cost-reimbursable type contract is awarded, as appropriate. Competitive proposals are

generally used when conditions are not appropriate for the use of sealed bids. If the competitive proposals method is used for a procurement under a grant, the following requirements apply:

- 1. Requests for Proposals shall be publicized and identify all evaluation factors and their relative importance. Any response to publicized requests for proposals shall be honored to the maximum extent practical.
- 2. Requests for Proposals shall be solicited from an adequate number of qualified sources.
- 3. <u>Recipient</u> shall have a method for conducting evaluations of the proposals received and for selecting awardees.
- 4. Awards will be made to the responsible offeror whose proposal will be most advantageous to the procuring party, with price (other than architectural/engineering) and other factors considered. Unsuccessful offerors will be promptly notified in writing.
- 5. <u>Recipient</u> should use competitive proposal procedures for qualification-based procurement of architectural/engineering (A/E) professional services whereby competitor's qualifications are evaluated and the most qualified competitor is selected, subject to negotiation of fair and reasonable compensation. The method, where price is not used as a selection factor, can <u>only</u> be used in the procurement of A/E professional services. It cannot be used to procure other types of services (e.g., administration professional services) even though A/E firms are a potential source to perform the proposed effort.
- E. Noncompetitive proposals is procurement through solicitation of a proposal from only one source, or after solicitation from a number of sources, competition is determined inadequate. Noncompetitive proposals may be used only when the award of a contract is infeasible under small purchase procedures, sealed bids (formal advertising), or competitive proposals. Circumstances under which a contract may be awarded by noncompetitive proposals are limited to the following:
  - 1. The item is available from only a single source;
  - 2. After solicitation of a number of sources, competition is determined inadequate;
  - 3. A public exigency or emergency exists when the urgency for the requirement will not permit a delay incident to competitive solicitation; and
  - 4. The awarding agency (IEDA) authorizes noncompetitive proposals. (Sole source procurement for supplies, equipment, construction, and services valued at \$25,000 or more must have prior approval of the Iowa Economic Development Authority).
- F. <u>Recipient</u> will provide, to the greatest extent possible, that contracts be awarded to qualified small and minority firms, women business enterprises, and labor surplus area firms whenever they are potential sources.
- G. Any other method of procurement must have prior approval of the Iowa Economic Development Authority.

### RECYCLED MATERIALS

Recipient will procure items with the highest percentage of recycled materials practical.

### CONTRACT PRICING

A. The cost plus a percentage of cost and percentage of construction cost method of contracting shall not be used.

B. <u>Recipient</u> shall perform some form of cost/price analysis for every procurement action, including modifications, amendments or change orders.

#### PROCUREMENT RECORDS

<u>Recipient</u> shall maintain records sufficient to detail the significant history of a procurement, including the rationale for the method of procurement, selection of contract type, contractor selection or rejection, and the basis for the contract price. (Recipient) shall make technical specifications and procurement documents available for review upon request.

#### BONDING REQUIREMENTS

Bonding requirements for construction or facility improvement contracts must meet the federal minimum requirements or receive a determination that the federal interest is adequately protected.

Present for the hearing: Courtney Clair, Zoran Pilipovic, their son and friend, Reserve Deputy Sheriff Gary Benson, and Benton County Attorney David Thompson. The board heard comments as follows:

Benson stated that he drove by the residence and noticed 1 dog tied up and recognized that it was a pit bull after he went to the residence. Mr. Pilipovic told Benson that there were 2 other pit bulls in the house. Under the notice they usually give 7 days to relocate the animal but since there was 3 animals he gave the owners 14 days. Clair stated that the dogs are a part of their family and that their landlord, Arlo Becker, does not have issues with them having the dogs. The dogs have never bitten or been vicious in any way. She is asking the board that if they do have to get rid of the dogs, could they be given a bigger time frame. They are wanting to wait to the end of school year for her daughter to finish school. If they have to get rid of the dogs the whole family would relocate since they are a part of her family. Thompson is asking the board to table the decision for 2 weeks to check on legality with the ordinance. The ordinance was put in place in 2000, he wants to make sure it is still lawful to list specific breeds in the ordinance. Primmer stated that he googled pit bulls and the comments are all over the board on the breed. Wiley had reservations on making variances or modifications to the ordinance. Decision is tabled for 2 weeks for the County Attorney to check on legality of the ordinance.

Jeff Lorenz with Cost Advisory Services met with the Board to explain the services his company provides. **Moved by Bierschenk/Primmer seconded:** Approve contract renewal with Cost Advisory Services for FY17, FY18 & FY19 for a cost of \$4,125/year. Motion carried.

Board visited the Veterans Affairs office. Toni Parizek, Benton County Veterans Affairs Director gave the board an update to the status of making Benton County a Home Base Iowa county. She also discussed other fundraisers and opportunities to increase knowledge on helping Veterans.

Board visited the Social Services office. Carol Zander, Benton County Social Services Director gave the board an update on the Mental Health region and programs going on with the region.

That each owner and each person in the possession or control of any lands in Benton County shall cut, burn or otherwise destroy all noxious weeds thereon, as defined in this chapter, at such times in each year and in such manner as shall prevent said weeds from blooming or coming to maturity, and shall keep said lands free from such growth of any other weeds as shall render the streets or highways adjoining said land unsafe for public travel. Additionally, weeds listed in Group 4 have been designated as noxious by the Benton County Board of Supervisors and will be controlled via the same procedures as state listed noxious weeds. Noxious weeds shall be cut or otherwise destroyed on or before <u>May 15</u>, 2017 and as often thereafter as is necessary to prevent seed production:

Group 1. Leafy Spurge, Perennial Peppergrass, Sour Dock, Smooth Dock, Sheep Sorrel, and Purple Loosestrife.

Group 2. Canada thistle, Russian Knapweed, Wild Mustard and Buckthorn.

- Group 3. European Morning Glory or Field Bindweed, Wild Carrot, Poison Hemlock, Multiflora Rose, Horsenettle, Perennial Sowthistle, Quackgrass, Butterprint, Puncture Vine, Cocklebur, Bull Thistle, Musk Thistle, Tall Thistle, Wild Sunflower, Shattercane and Teasel.
- Group 4. Palmer Amaranth (Amaranthus palmeri)

2. That each owner and each person in the possession or control of any lands in Benton County infested with any of the following noxious weeds shall adopt a program of weed destruction described by the Weed Commissioner, which may be expected to destroy and will immediately keep under control such infestations of said noxious weeds.

- (a) Primary Noxious Weeds: Quackgrass, Perennial Sowthistle, Canada Thistle, Bull Thistle, Musk Thistle, European Morning Glory or Field Bindweed, Horsenettle, Leafy Spurge, Perennial Peppergrass, Russian Knapweed, Buckthorn, Tall Thistle, Purple Loosestrife, and all other species of thistles belonging in general of Cirsium and Carduus.
- (b) Secondary Noxious Weeds: Butterprint, Cocklebur, Wild Mustard, Puncturevine, Teasel, Wild Carrot, Buckthorn Plantain, Sheep Sorrel, Sour Dock, Smooth Dock, Poison Hemlock, Wild Sunflower, Multiflora Rose and Shattercane.
- (c) Benton County Noxious Weeds: Palmer Amaranth

3. That if the owners or persons in possession or control of any land in Benton County fail to comply with the foregoing orders, the Weed Commissioner or his designee shall cause this to be done and the expense of said work, including costs of serving notice and other costs, if any, shall be assessed against the real estate.

4. That the County Engineer is hereby directed to cause notice of the making and entering of the foregoing order by one publication in each of the official newspapers of the County.

She wanted to give the heads up that there might need to be a service area amendment before the fiscal year ends.

Discussion on the county air conditioning policy was brought up by Maintenance Supervisor Rick Bramow. He wanted guidance if the board was still in favor of this policy. The policy states that thermostats in all county buildings during times that air is being used that the room temp is to be set at 75 or above, and when the boilers are being used, set at 70 degrees or below. David Thompson and Kelly Geater were present to voice some concerns. Thompson being up on the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor and wearing suits and ties can be extra warm, he feels there should be a little give or take as long as the thermostats get turned back down at night. Geater pointed out that the extra humidity at certain times makes the printers not work effectively. Bramow asked about not shutting air conditioners all the way off at night, but turning the settings down to help maintain the room temps and allows for the air to keep up. Pulling shades to block out sunlight and keeping doors shut should also help. Some re-routing of vents to less used rooms and allowing more access into the busier areas can also be made. The board agreed to those ideas along with placing some ceiling fans around and purchasing a dehumidifier to see if that will help keep some of these problem areas cooler.

The county can, by ordinance or resolution, prohibit or limit the use of consumer or display fireworks, but could not prohibit the sale. Auditor Rippel advised that the conservation department will still not allow the use of fireworks inside the county's parks. Sales are slated to start by June 1, 2017, but with the continued wait on administrative rules from the state, there was no action taken. Discussion will continue at the May 30th supervisor's meeting.

Section 2. Subject to the provisions of other county procedures and regulations and applicable state law, the appropriations authorized under Section 1 shall constitute authorization for the department or officer listed to make expenditures or incur obligations, effective July 1, 2017.

Section 3. In accordance with Section 331.437, Code of Iowa, no department or officer shall expend or contract to expend any money or incur any liability, or enter into any contract, which by its terms involves the expenditure of money for any purpose in excess of the amounts appropriated pursuant to this resolution.

Section 4. If at any time during the 2017-2018 budget year the auditor shall ascertain that the available resources of a fund for that year will be less than said fund's total appropriations, she shall immediately so inform the Board and recommend appropriate corrective action.

Section 5. The auditor shall establish separate accounts for the appropriations authorized in Section 1, each of which account shall indicate the amount of the appropriation, the amounts charged thereto, and the unencumbered balance. The auditor shall report the status of such accounts to the applicable departments and officers at least quarterly during the 2017-2018 budget year.

Section 6. Tax Increment payments, which are subject to annual appropriation are authorized.

Section 7. All appropriations authorized pursuant to this resolution lapse at the end of the business day on June 20, 2018, for payment of goods and services received and/or performed as of that date. The board reserves the right to waive this date at its sole discretion for specific payments for the provision of goods and services that it deems should be paid within said fiscal year.

Section 8. Departmental appropriations remain in full force and effect through June 30, 2018, for payroll expenses occurring after the date stated in Section 7, for the final processing of expenses submitted on or before June 20, 2018, and for any expenses approved by the Board of Supervisors subsequent to June 20, 2018. All appropriations will lapse at the close of business June 30, 2018.

There was 3 phone calls received prior to the meeting from adjacent owners that were opposed to the change. Devera voiced his opposition about the concern of this affecting the value of his property with the proposed use of an apartment.

There is also security needs for county offices and facilities. Currently the county laready owns. Use the space we have and upgrade it. Primmer said the departments have common needs, there could be conference rooms and training equipment that could be shared. Bierschenk agreed that it would be more efficient for these offices to be near the courthouse. Another suggestion was to have a general receptionist or assistant to be up front and direct people where they need to go.

Chris Young, rural resident was requesting a variance for his driveway along 30<sup>th</sup> Ave. Drive. The county passed a driveway resolution in April of 2008. In said policy there is a 500foot sight distance requirement and he is about 100 'short to the North. Young needs this for his trucking business and is willing to help pay for a blind driveway sign if the county would grant the variance. **Bierschenk moved/Primmer seconded:** To approve the variance for driveway sight distance requirements and allow Chris Young to cover the costs of the blind driveway and lowered speed limit signs that the secondary roads department will install. Motion carried.

Nick Longbucco with the Nature Conservancy provided the Board a map with Oxbow pond locations within Benton County. The main topic of interest was the ones located at the corner of 77<sup>th</sup> Street and 23<sup>rd</sup> Ave, East of the City of Blairstown. They would like to explore the opportunity to dig it back out, after comparing a map from the 1950s to the present, you could see how the stream changed. **Primmer moved/Bierschenk seconded:**To allow the Nature Conservancy to further explore the nature of oxbows on this Blairstown property location and work along with the county conservation in this matter. Motion carried.

Karen Phelps, Conservation Director discussed the possible need for a budget amendment for FY 18. One of the park rangers leaving and a new hire that will need to attend the academy. The combined estimated cost with everything including travel and uniforms is roughly \$9,000.00. Phelps said she will work with the Auditor and they can stretch this out until later in the fiscal year but wanted to bring this to the Boards attention.

**Bierschenk moved/Primmer seconded**: To approve minutes of December 12, 2017. Motion carried. Clarification was had on the handbook section 5.1, regarding separation date and how it affects health insurance coverage. The Board was hesitant to amend the handbook, so a suggestion was made to provide a variance to the wording and have it read the 10<sup>th</sup> of the month following separation date and advised the Auditor's office to allow this employee to pay half of their premium by the 10<sup>th</sup> of January to allow for continued coverage through December. Then if this employee wishes to apply for cobra, they can continue on with health insurance coverage at their own expense.

### **RESOLUTION #17-87**

WHEREAS, Benton County ("County") is concerned with the recent rapid rise in troubles among County citizens, residents, and visitors in relation to problems arising out of the use, abuse and overuse of opioid medications, which according to certain studies, impacts millions of people across the country; and

WHEREAS, issues and concerns surrounding opioid use, abuse and overuse by citizens, residents and visitors are not unique to County and are, in fact, issues and concerns shared by all other counties in Iowa and, for that matter, states and counties across the country, as has been well documented through various reports and publications, and is commonly referred to as the Opioid Epidemic ("Opioid Epidemic:); and

WHEREAS, the societal costs associated with the Opioid Epidemic are staggering and, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, amount to over \$75 billion annually; and

WHEREAS, the National Institute for Health has identified the manufacturers of certain of the opioid medications as being directly responsible for the rapid rise of the Opioid Epidemic by virtue of their aggressive and, according to some, unlawful and unethical marketing practices; and

WHEREAS, certain of the opioid manufacturers have faced civil and criminal liability for their actions that relate directly to the rise of the Opioid Epidemic; and

WHEREAS, County has spent money in unexpected and unbudgeted time and resources in its programs and services related to the Opioid Epidemic; and

WHEREAS, County is responsible for a multitude of programs and services, all of which require County to expend resources generated through state and federal aid, property tax levy, fees and other permissible revenue sources; and

WHEREAS, County's provision of programs and services becomes more and more difficult every year because the costs associated with providing the Opioid Epidemic programs and services continue to rise, yet County's ability to generate revenue is limited by strict levy limit caps and stagnant or declining state and federal aid to County; and

WHEREAS, all sums that County expends in addressing, combatting and otherwise dealing with the Opioid Epidemic are sums that cannot be used for other critical programs and services that County provides to County citizens, residents and visitors; and

WHEREAS, County has been informed that numerous counties and states across the country have filed or intend to file lawsuits against certain of the opioid manufacturers in an effort to force the persons and entities responsible for the Opioid Epidemic to assume financial responsibility for the costs associated with addressing, combatting and otherwise dealing with the Opioid Epidemic; and

WHEREAS, County has engaged in discussions with representatives of the law firms of Crueger Dickinson LLC, Simmons Hanly Conroy LLC, and von Briesen & Roper, s.c., (the "Law Firms") related to the potential for County to pursue certain legal claims against certain opioid manufacturers; and

WHEREAS, County has been informed that the Law Firms have the requisite skill, experience and wherewithal to prosecute legal claims against certain of the opioid manufacturers on behalf of public entities seeking to hold them responsible for the Opioid Epidemic; and

WHEREAS, the Law Firms have proposed that County engage the Law Firms to prosecute the aforementioned claims on a contingent fee basis whereby the Law Firms would not be compensated unless County receives a financial benefit as a result of the proposed claims and the Law Firms would advance all claim-related costs and expenses associated with the claims; and

WHEREAS, all of the costs and expenses associated with the claims against certain of the opioid manufacturers would be borne by the Law Firms; and

WHEREAS, the Law Firms have prepared an engagement letter, which is submitted as part of this Resolution ("Engagement Letter") specifying the terms and conditions under which the Law Firms would provide legal services to County and otherwise consistent with the terms of this Resolution; and

WHEREAS, County is informed that the Iowa Counties Association has engaged in extensive discussions with the Law Firms and has expressed a desire to assist the Law Firms, County and other counties in the prosecution of claims against certain of the opioid manufacturers; and

WHEREAS, County would participate in the prosecution of the claim(s) contemplated in this Resolution and the Engagement Letter by providing information and materials to the Law Firms and, as appropriate, the Wisconsin Counties Association as needed; and

WHEREAS, County believes it to be in the best interest of County, its citizens, residents, visitors and taxpayers to join with other counties in and outside Wisconsin in pursuit of claims against certain of the opioid manufacturers, all upon the terms and conditions set forth in the Engagement Letter; and

WHEREAS, by pursuing the claims against certain of the opioid manufacturers, County is attempting to hold those persons and entities that had a significant role in the creation of the Opioid Epidemic responsible for the financial costs assumed by County and other public agencies across the country in dealing with the Opioid Epidemic.

### NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

County authorizes, and agrees to be bound by, the Engagement Letter and hereby directs the appropriate officer of the County to execute the Engagement Letter on behalf of the County; and

#### **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:**

County shall endeavor to faithfully perform all actions required of County in relation to the claims contemplated herein and in the Engagement Letter and hereby directs all County personnel to cooperate with and assist the Law Firms in relation thereto.
