WHEREAS, by adopting a construction evaluation resolution the board of supervisors agrees to evaluate every construction permit application for a proposed confinement feeding operation structure received by the board of supervisors between February 1, 2018 and January 31, 2019 and submit an adopted recommendation regarding that application to the DNR; and

WHEREAS, the board of supervisors must conduct an evaluation of every construction permit application using the master matrix created in Iowa Code section 459.305, but the board's recommendation to the DNR may be based on the final score on the master matrix or may be based on reasons other than the final score on the master matrix;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF BENTON COUNTY that the Board of Supervisors hereby adopts this construction evaluation resolution pursuant to lowa Code section 459.304(3).

against the request after notifying the required adjacent land owners, 2 of which were relatives. Hearing no other further comments the public hearing was closed.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT THE FOLLOWING policies are adopted for the part-time employees in the Benton County Sheriff's Department:

- Part-time employees shall receive compensation at the rate of 1.5 times their regular hourly rate of pay for hours worked on a holiday or for each hour worked in excess of 40 hours per week. Holidays, for purposes of this section, are as defined in the most current labor contract between Benton County Sheriff's Department, Vinton, Iowa and the Chauffers, Teamsters & Helpers Local Union No. 238, affiliated with the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, Chauffers & Helpers of America.
- 2. Starting wages per hour shall be the same as a starting full-time employee in their respective job classifications after training, except for part-time office administration employees.
- Starting wages of part-time office administration employees shall be as agreed on by the Sheriff or his/her
 designee, and the Benton County Board of Supervisors. Part-time office administration employees are not
 covered under or subject to Paragraphs 4, 5, 6, 10 and 11.
- 4. Training Wage: An employee starting out with no experience will start at a wage of \$2.00 per hour less than a first year wage of a full-time employee in their respective job classification. If the trainee has prior experience, the trainee may be started at a higher training wage as agreed upon by the Sheriff or his/her designee, and the Benton County Board of Supervisors.
- 5. Training wages: All new employees shall complete a 120 days probation period. During that time the wage shall be \$2.00 an hour less than that of the starting full time position. After a trainee has attained some experience in "on the job training", completed the 120 day probation period, but not reached a status that they may work alone and/or obtained all necessary certifications as required of the position, the training wage may be increased \$1.00 per hour. After all training is completed the employee has reached a status that they may work alone, the wage may be moved to that of a starting fulltime employee.
- Step Raises for: Part time Corrections Officers, Communications Specialists, Food Service, Deputy Sheriff

- An employee must work a minimum of one year and 1,000 hours before being eligible for step raise comparable to that of a full-time employee after one year.
- 2. An employee must work a minimum of two years and 2,000 hours comparable to that of a full-time employee after two years.
- An employee must work a minimum of seven years and 7,000 hours before being eligible for a step raise comparable to that of a full-time employee after ten years.
- 4. An employee must work a minimum of fifteen years and 15,000 hours before being eligible for a step raise comparable to that of a full-time employee after twenty years.
- 5. These step raises will not be automatic but will be based on job performance, attendance, and willingness to work requested hours. Any part-time person who fails to actively work within any consecutive six-month period shall lose their accumulated hours towards reaching the 1000 hour requirement set forth above.
- 7. a. Any part-time employee advancing to a full-time position, with the same job classification shall retain their current wage status.
 - b. Any part-time employee advancing to a full-time position and the job classification is new or different from the current job classification that the employee is filling the wage shall be within the union agreement and agreed upon by the employee the board of supervisors and the Sheriff.
 - c. Part time Employees advancing to fulltime status and the job classification is under the civil service commission are not covered under this agreement.
- Part-time employment will not be used for calculations of any other type of benefits for employees going from part-time to full-time.
- 9. Part-time employees are not entitled to longevity pay.
- 10. Part-time employees shall receive a \$.50 per hour shift differential for night shifts worked after successful completion of training. A night shift for purposes of this section is as defined in the most current labor contract between Benton County Sheriff's Department, Vinton, Iowa and the Chauffers, Teamsters & Helpers Local Union No. 238, affiliated with the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, Chauffers & Helpers of America.
- 11. Part-time employees shall receive a \$.75 per hour shift differential for weekend shifts worked after successful completion of training. A weekend shift for purposes of this section is as defined in the most current labor contract between Benton County Sheriff's Department, Vinton, Iowa and the Chauffers, Teamsters & Helpers Local Union No. 238, affiliated with the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, Chauffers & Helpers of America.
- 12. A Reserve Deputy (hired on or after February 27, 2018) NOT PART TIME DEPUTY SHERIFF
 - 1. Reserve Deputy Sheriff is defined in Iowa Code section, 80D. All new employees are subject to a 120 day probation period.
 - 2. All Reserve Deputy Sheriff training shall be in accordance with Iowa code section 80 D.
 - a. Training shall be paid for by Benton County Sheriff. The reserve officer in training will volunteer the time required to complete the training.
 - b. The Reserve officer in training shall volunteer 80 hours of on the job training.
 - c. A Reserve Deputy Sheriff hired on or after February 27th, 2018 shall be paid under the following terms, A Reserve Deputy in training shall be paid \$2.00 an hour less than that of a full time Deputy Sheriff. After the completion of the required firearms training and 80 hours volunteer time. After the completion of all required Reserve Deputy training the Reserve Deputy Sheriff shall be paid \$1.00 an hour less than that of a starting full time Deputy Sheriff.

d. After working 500 hours a Reserve Deputy Sheriff may be paid the wage of a starting full-time Deputy Sheriff.

e. After working 1500 hours a Reserve Deputy Sheriff may be paid the wage of a full-time Deputy Sheriff after one year of employment.

f. A Reserve Deputy Sheriff hired on or after February 27, 2018 and has completed the Reserve Officer training prior to employment with Benton County Sheriff may be paid \$2.00 an hour less than the wage of a starting Fulltime Deputy Sheriff starting wage. After the 120 day probation period and the Reserve Officer is able to work alone in accordance with lowa code section 80D the Reserve Deputy may be paid \$1.00 less than the wage of a starting fulltime Deputy Sheriff. After working 500 hours the reserve Deputy Sheriff may be paid the wage of fulltime starting Deputy Sheriff. After 1500 hours the Reserve Deputy may be paid the wage of a fulltime deputy Sheriff after one year of employment.

This agreement is subject to change with or without notice at the sole discretion of the Benton County Board of Supervisors and the Benton County Sheriff, or his/her designee.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that any prior agreement relative to wages and benefits of part-time employees in the Benton County Sheriff's Department is repealed upon adoption of this resolution and specifically repeals Resolution #s13-21, and #16-85 in their entirety.

WHEREAS, Sections 331.402 and 331.441 of the Code of Iowa authorize counties to enter into Ioan agreements and borrow money for the purpose of paying the cost of acquiring, remodeling and equipping buildings for use by County employees; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors (the "Board") of Benton County, Iowa (the "County"), has proposed to enter into a loan agreement (the "Loan Agreement") in a principal amount not to exceed \$550,000, pursuant to the provisions of Sections 331.402 and 331.441 of the Code of Iowa, for the purpose of paying the costs, to that extent, of acquiring and renovating a building to house County employees, and has published a notice and held a hearing on that proposal; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary at this time for the Board to express its intent to authorize the loan agreement for the purpose set out above and to express its intent to issue General Obligation County Building Bonds in a principal amount not to exceed \$550,000 (the "Bonds") to be issued in the future in evidence of the obligation of the County under the loan agreement;

NOW, THEREFORE, Be it resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Benton County, Iowa, as follows:

Section 1.The County hereby determines to enter into a General Obligation County Building Loan Agreement in the future, providing for a loan to the County in a principal amount not to exceed \$550,000 for the purpose set forth in the preamble hereof.

Section 2. The County also determines to issue the Bonds at the time such funds are needed.

Section 3.For the purpose of providing for the levy and collection of a direct annual tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the Bonds, there is hereby ordered levied on all the taxable property in the County a direct annual tax for collection in the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2018, sufficient to produce the amount of \$550,000.

Section 4.A certified copy of this resolution shall be filed with the County Auditor, and the County Auditor is hereby instructed to enter for collection and assess the tax hereby authorized. When entering such taxes for collection, the County Auditor shall include the same as a part of the tax levy for Debt Service Fund purposes of the County and when collected, the proceeds of the taxes shall be converted into the Debt Service Fund of the County and set aside therein as a special account to be used solely and only for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds and for no other purpose whatsoever.

Section 5.All resolutions or parts thereof in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

His review of the project found that the proposed construction meets the requirements as set out in the Law, with one exception, but Mr. Schulte has received a written waiver of distance separation from a neighbor to compensate for that.

Bierschenk moved/Wiley seconded: To approve the minutes of May 1, 2018. Motion carried.

Sheriff Tippett discussed current law enforcement contracts with the City of Walford and Shellsburg. Walford gave notice that they will be going with Linn county starting in July. He asked to extend the City of Shellsburg's contract for an additional 6 months. Shellsburg is ranked 3rd in population for the county and 8th in how much time is spent there. Every deputy commits 3 hours of their 8 hour shifts for contracted law enforcement. City of Atkins has the most calls, while the most time is spent in Keystone. Tippett said the eastern side of the county has more calls that could be impacted by their closeness to Cedar Rapids. The board asked that Tippet analyze costs and come back in for further discussion and action.

The time of 9:30 a.m. having arrived, the chairman opened the public hearing on the proposed resolution to buy and exchange county property. The following persons were present: Jim Morrison representing the news media, Benton County Attorney David Thompson, Mike Elwick, Toni Parizek, Veterans Affairs Director, Mary Lee Summy, Mike Silhanek, Dale Henry and Bill Newton.

The County Attorney shared the proposed resolution with those present. Thompson stated historically this county has been looking for a solution for more office space needs for quite some time. The courthouse is not big enough for everything that Benton County has to do to govern the county. Referring to the old Theisens building as a previous purchase years ago that didn't work out, the board has done their due diligence and this was the proposed deal and is out of the flood plain. The old building that used to house DHS (Department of Human Services) offices was also looked into. The prices were too high to remodel or build to what was needed. There will be room for a conference room and also an office space for Benton County Historical Society. Along with this building purchase comes 3.2 acres of land. There is possibility for expansion in the future as well as mentioning to possibly move the transportation offices and vehicles out of the flood plain.

Toni Parizek, Benton County Veterans Affairs director was concerned of the new location. She agreed to the positive of being out of the flood plain but felt with it not being in close proximity to the courthouse that some wouldn't take the extra time to travel. Supervisor Primmer pointed out that there would need to be signage put out for notification, and other ways to get the word out cheaper like social media for example. Supervisors Bierschenk brought up the Linn

County's government and all the different locations for an example. County Attorney pointed out that the walls are paper thin at the current office location. Primmer handed out a rough draft of an office layout plan and explained this was all just that, a rough plan. Mary Summy asked the board if all these needs would be met after the move including handicap accessibility and signage. DOT approval will be needed for signage placement. The security committee would look at doorways, but it was agreed this will be more accessible than the current Governor Sherman Building. Primmer also noting about the parking expansion in the new area will be an added bonus. Mike Elwick observed how along 1st Ave, there was limited handicap spots and felt the new location would be a definite positive. Supervisor Wiley agreeing about the parking options and less traffic in the new location but also pointing out how Parizek's position was recently made full time and he felt this was a good opportunity relative to this change. Wiley also reminding everyone that the county is currently paying rent to lease office space from Elwick and over the next 3 years, that amount spent on lease will make this purchase even more attractive. Supervisor Bierschenk would like to see a spike in the amount of Veterans served in Benton County because of this move and feels this is a very positive thing for the county and that everyone will need to work through the challenges that come with change. Dale Henry, local veteran and adjoining neighbor to the new location, doesn't feel this will cause a decline, he feels enough local vets like himself can share the information at meetings and get the word out. Elwick welcomed anyone who wanted to go look through the building, he'd be more than happy to show them around. Moving forward things will get worked out as far as doorways and other renovations needed and keeping the welfare of the public in mind as well as all of the employees. Hearing no further public comments, the supervisors agreed to meet with Parizek at a later time but they needed to move on.

RESOLUTION #18-23 RESOLUTION TO BUY AND EXCHANGE COUNTY PROPERTY PURSUANT TO IOWA CODE SECTION 331.361

WHEREAS Section 331.361, Iowa Code, allows the County to buy and exchange real estate for the benefit of the public good; and

WHEREAS, the Supervisors believe it would benefit the governance of Benton County to establish a central administrative office complex to address the County's lack of office space for offices that cannot be located in the Courthouse: and

WHEREAS, the Supervisors also believe a central administrative office complex should be located out of the flood zone; and

WHEREAS the County has for a considerable time rented office space for the Iowa Department of Human Services at 811 D Avenue, Vinton, IA and the owners of that building, Michael and Cindy Elwick, have indicated that they are willing to sell said building and its 3.2 acres of land to the County: and

WHEREAS a consolidation of County offices into 811 D Avenue would allow Benton County to stop using the Governor Sherman Building for office space and would allow the County to return the Governor Sherman Building to private ownership which would place it on the tax rolls; and

WHEREAS the additional land located at 811 D Avenue would allow the County, over time, to move additional facilities out of the flood zone, and

WHEREAS, a proper notice of the date, time and place of hearing on this issue has been published and a hearing has been held and following said hearing, the Supervisors have determined that, in fact, it would benefit the public to purchase 811 D Avenue.

NOW THEREFORE, be it resolved that the County is purchasing from Michael and Cindy Elwick the property located at 811 D Avenue, Vinton, Iowa and described as to-wit:

The North Twenty-five (25) feet of lots One (1) and Two (2), Block Two (2), Donelan's Addition to Vinton, Iowa; AND

RESOLUTION #18-24

"Stepping Up to Reduce the Number of People with Mental Illnesses in Jails"

WHEREAS, counties routinely provide treatment services to the estimated 2 million people with serious mental illnesses booked into jail each year;

WHEREAS, prevalence rates of serious mental illnesses in jails are three to six times higher than for the general public;

WHEREAS, almost three-quarters of adults with serious mental illnesses in jails have co-occurring substance use disorders:

WHEREAS, adults with mental illnesses tend to stay longer in jail and, upon release, are at a higher risk of recidivism than people without these disorders;

WHEREAS, county jails spend two to three times more on adults with mental illnesses that require interventions compared to those without these treatment needs;

WHEREAS, without the appropriate treatment and services, people with mental illnesses continue to cycle through the criminal justice system, often resulting in tragic outcomes for these individuals and their families;

WHEREAS, Benton County and all counties take pride in their responsibility to protect and enhance the health, welfare, and safety of its residents in efficient and cost-effective ways;

WHEREAS, through Stepping Up, the National Association of Counties, The Council of State Governments Justice Center, and the American Psychiatric Association Foundation are encouraging public, private, and nonprofit partners to reduce the number of people with mental illnesses in jails.

NOW THEREFORE, LET IT BE RESOLVED THAT, Benton County, does hereby sign on to the Call to Action to reduce the number of people with mental illnesses in our county jail, commit to sharing, lessons learned with other counties in my state and across the country to support a national initiative and encourage all county officials, employees, and residents to participate in Stepping Up. We resolve to utilize the comprehensive resources available through Stepping Up to:

- Convene or draw on a diverse team of leaders and decision makers from multiple agencies committed to safely reducing the number of people with mental illness in jails;
- Collect and review prevalence numbers and assess individuals' needs to better identify adults entering jails with mental illnesses and their recidivism risk, and use that baseline information to guide decision making at the system, program, and case levels;
- Examine treatment and service capacity to determine which programs and services are available in the county
 for people with mental illnesses and co-occurring substance use disorders, and identify state and local policy
 and funding barriers to minimizing contact with the justice system
- Develop a plan with measurable outcomes that draws on the jail assessment and prevalence data and the examination of available treatment and service capacity, while considering identified barriers;
- Implement research-based approaches that advance the plan; and
- Create a process to track progress using data and information systems, and to report on successes.

Resolution #18-25 DESTRUCTION OF NOXIOUS WEEDS

Be It Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Benton County, Iowa that pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 317, Code of Iowa, it is hereby ordered:

- 1. That each owner and each person in the possession or control of any lands in Benton County shall cut, burn or otherwise destroy all noxious weeds thereon, as defined in this chapter, at such times in each year and in such manner as shall prevent said weeds from blooming or coming to maturity, and shall keep said lands free from such growth of any other weeds as shall render the streets or highways adjoining said land unsafe for public travel. Additionally, weeds listed in Group 4 have been designated as noxious by the Benton County Board of Supervisors and will be controlled via the same procedures as state listed noxious weeds. Noxious weeds shall be cut or otherwise destroyed on or before May 28, 2018 and as often thereafter as is necessary to prevent seed production:
 - Group 1. Leafy Spurge, Perennial Peppergrass, Sour Dock, Smooth Dock, Sheep Sorrel, and Purple Loosestrife.
 - Group 2. Canada thistle, Russian Knapweed, Wild Mustard and Buckthorn.
 - **Group 3.** European Morning Glory or Field Bindweed, Wild Carrot, Poison Hemlock, Multiflora Rose, Horsenettle, Perennial Sowthistle, Quackgrass, Butterprint, Puncture Vine, Cocklebur, Bull Thistle, Musk Thistle, Tall Thistle, Wild Sunflower, Shattercane and Teasel.

Group 4. Palmer Amaranth (*Amaranthus palmeri*)

- 2. That each owner and each person in the possession or control of any lands in Benton County infested with any of the following noxious weeds shall adopt a program of weed destruction described by the Weed Commissioner, which may be expected to destroy and will immediately keep under control such infestations of said noxious weeds.
 - (a) Primary Noxious Weeds: Quackgrass, Perennial Sowthistle, Canada Thistle, Bull Thistle, Musk Thistle, European Morning Glory or Field Bindweed, Horsenettle, Leafy Spurge, Perennial Peppergrass, Russian Knapweed, Buckthorn, Tall Thistle, Purple Loosestrife, and all other species of thistles belonging in general of Cirsium and Carduus.
 - (b) Secondary Noxious Weeds: Butterprint, Cocklebur, Wild Mustard, Puncturevine, Teasel, Wild Carrot, Buckthorn Plantain, Sheep Sorrel, Sour Dock, Smooth Dock, Poison Hemlock, Wild Sunflower, Multiflora Rose and Shattercane.
 - (c) Benton County Noxious Weeds: Palmer Amaranth
- 3. That if the owners or persons in possession or control of any land in Benton County fail to comply with the foregoing orders, the Weed Commissioner or his designee shall cause this to be done and the expense of said work, including costs of serving notice and other costs, if any, shall be assessed against the real estate.
- 4. That the County Engineer is hereby directed to cause notice of the making and entering of the foregoing order by one publication in each of the official newspapers of the County.

An average officer salary with benefits and everything is \$39.95 an hour, and on top of this are added fuel and vehicle costs. It was agreed the costs will need to be adjusted to be more realistic. During the next year, county could do a cost analysis and take to the city councils for FY2020 contracts, since all have put together their 2019 budget. The board will wait and see what Sheriff will recommend for these communities and what contracted hours would be fair. Reconcile the difference between caseloads as well with each city. The dilemma is not just with the city of Shellsburg, but with every community whom the sheriff's department contracts with said Wiley. Mayor Speckner agreed why the rates need to increase. Federal and State grants and/or reimbursements expendable during the fiscal year are hereby appropriated to the designated departments or offices. For purposes of this resolution all departments relating to elections are considered one department. Further, the auditor is authorized to expend funds from the following budgets: Auditor, Elections, District Court, General Services, Non-departmental, GIS, Medical Examiner, Human Resources, and other budgets not under the specific authority of an elected official or full-time county official to ensure the day-to-day operations of the county.

Section 2. Subject to the provisions of other county procedures and regulations and applicable state law, the appropriations authorized under Section 1 shall constitute authorization for the department or officer listed to make expenditures or incur obligations, effective July 1, 2018.

Section 3. In accordance with Section 331.437, Code of Iowa, no department or officer shall expend or contract to expend any money or incur any liability, or enter into any contract, which by its terms involves the expenditure of money for any purpose in excess of the amounts appropriated pursuant to this resolution.

Section 4. If at any time during the 2018-2019 budget year the auditor shall ascertain that the available resources of a fund for that year will be less than said fund's total appropriations, she shall immediately so inform the Board and recommend appropriate corrective action.

Section 5. The auditor shall establish separate accounts for the appropriations authorized in Section 1, each of which account shall indicate the amount of the appropriation, the amounts charged thereto, and the unencumbered balance. The auditor shall report the status of such accounts to the applicable departments and officers at least quarterly during the 2018-2019 budget year.

Section 6. Tax Increment payments, which are subject to annual appropriation are authorized.

Section 7. All appropriations authorized pursuant to this resolution lapse at the end of the business day on June 19, 2019, for payment of goods and services received and/or performed as of that date. The board reserves the right to waive this date at its sole discretion for specific payments for the provision of goods and services that it deems should be paid within said fiscal year.

Section 8. Departmental appropriations remain in full force and effect through June 30, 2019, for payroll expenses occurring after the date stated in Section 7, for the final processing of expenses submitted on or before June 25, 2019, and for any expenses approved by the Board of Supervisors subsequent to June 25, 2019. All appropriations will lapse at the close of business June 30, 2019.

Resolution authorizing and approving a Loan Agreement and providing for the issuance of a \$550,000 General Obligation County Building Note

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of Section 331.402 of the Code of Iowa, the Board of Supervisors (the "Board") of Benton County, Iowa (the "County"), has heretofore proposed to contract indebtedness and enter into a Ioan agreement (the "Loan Agreement") in a principal amount not to exceed \$550,000, for the purpose of paying the cost, to that extent, of acquiring and renovating a building to house County employees, and has published notice of the proposed action and has held a hearing thereon; and

WHEREAS, bids have been received and noted in the minutes for the purchase of a \$550,000 General Obligation County Building Note, (the "Note") in evidence of the obligation of the County under the Loan Agreement, and it is necessary at this time to authorize and approve the Loan Agreement and to make provision for the issuance the Note;

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Benton County, Iowa, as follows:

Section 1.The Board hereby determines that the bid from Cedar Valley Bank & Trust, Vinton, Iowa (the "Bank") is the best bid, providing the lowest interest cost to the County, and the Board determines to enter into the Loan Agreement with the Bank, providing for a loan to the County in the principal amount of \$550,000 for the purpose set forth in the preamble hereof.

The Chairperson and County Auditor are hereby authorized and directed to sign the Loan Agreement on behalf of the County, and the Loan Agreement is hereby approved.

Section 2.The Note is hereby authorized to be issued in evidence of the obligation of the County under the Loan Agreement, in the principal amount of \$550,000 for the purpose set forth in the preamble hereof.

The County Auditor is hereby designated as the registrar and paying agent for the Note and may be hereinafter referred to as the "Registrar" or the "Paying Agent."

Principal of the Note shall be payable in two equal installments in the amount of \$275,000 each, on December 1, 2018 and June 1, 2019.

Accrued interest on the Note shall be payable on December 1, 2018 and June 1, 2019. Interest shall be calculated on the basis of a 360-day year comprised of twelve 30-day months.

Payment of both principal of and interest on the Note shall be made to the registered owner appearing on the registration books of the County at the close of business on the fifteenth day of the month next preceding the payment date and shall be paid by check or draft mailed to the registered owner at the address shown on such registration books; provided, however, that the final installment of principal and interest shall be payable only upon presentation and surrender of the Note to the Paying Agent.

The County reserves the right to prepay principal of the Note in whole or in part at any time prior to and in inverse order of maturity on terms of par and accrued interest. All principal so prepaid shall cease to bear interest on the prepayment date.

The Note shall be executed on behalf of the County with the official manual or facsimile signature of the Chairperson and attested by the official manual or facsimile signature of the County Auditor and shall be a fully registered Note without interest coupons. In case any officer whose signature or the facsimile of whose signature appears on the Note shall cease to be such officer before the delivery of the Note, such signature or such facsimile signature shall nevertheless be valid and sufficient for all purposes, the same as if such officer had remained in office until delivery.

The Note shall be fully registered as to principal and interest in the name of the owner on the registration books of the County kept by the Registrar, and after such registration, payment of the principal thereof and interest thereon shall be made only to the registered owner or its legal representatives or assigns. The Note shall be transferable without cost to the registered owner thereof only upon the registration books of the County upon presentation to the Registrar, together with either a written instrument of transfer satisfactory to the Registrar or the assignment form thereon completed and duly executed by the registered owner or the duly authorized attorney for such registered owner.

The record and identity of any owners of the Note shall be kept confidential as provided by Section 22.7 of the Code of Iowa.

Sheriff Ron Tippett and Deputy John Lindaman compiled some data and analyzed the law enforcement contract data from the municipalities which contract services with Benton County between September 1, 2017 and May 31, 2018. All dispatched calls are tracked since 911 started back in the 90s. Comparing per capita rates, it might not be fair to all involved, but they hope to make it equitable. It was reported that it would take \$34/hour to cover the actual costs of the contract. Lindaman stated that an increase in the cost for law enforcement for a community is still lower than it would cost a community to start its own police department. A proposed rate to at least cover the wage of the officer would be a start. Needs do vary among towns, and those who do not have a contract and do not have its own police department, the sheriff's department would still have to respond for reports of assaults and crimes of violence. Tippett proposed having a

meeting with all the communities and the county, get input from each on what they feel will be an equitable contract rate. Shellsburg Mayor Lonnie Speckner pointed out that cities are already paying a county tax, and he agreed to an increased rate. Jackie Michael, City of Urbana council member mentioned how Urbana doesn't contract a lot of hours but they do reciprocate calls. Supervisors agreed the task force of communities is a good idea, but rates for 2018-19 will continue as is, and hope to have all this figured out before the 2019-2020 budget planning takes place for everyone.

The Supervisors revisited the previous topic of changing the county's land use policy. They invited the county zoning commission members to join in the discussion along with Benton County's Land Use office, Benton Development

Group along with a few others. Members of the commission present were: Mark Kotouc, Elaine Harrington, Steve Thompson, Larry Beatty, Nancy Jensen and Larry Koster. Marc Greenlee, Land Use Administrator started out by explaining the county's land use ordinance. It established the entire unincorporated area of Benton County as an agricultural land use district in 1986. No real changes to the ordinance have been made since. Any new non-agricultural use has to be reviewed by the board of supervisors. A farm is defined as being 21 or more acres used in the commercial production of farm products according to the plan. Some use farm exemptions to build houses on the quality land. Adding that land to be changed needs to have a corn suitability rating (CSR) under 70. Kate Robertson of BDG stated that from an economic standpoint, they would like to see development along the HWY 30 corridor. They would like to see an amendment to the current plan, and later on look at the whole plan. Kristina Kremer also with BDG, wants to make it easy to do business in the county and to get people to want to come here. How do we bring growth and how can we make that happen so the county reaps the reward off taxation? If something new is going to be done, it needs to follow the Iowa Code per Greenlee, and needs to start with comprehensive mapping of the county. The current plan calls for preserving agricultural land. Zoning Commission member Elaine Harrington stressed that Benton County needs growth and the room to progress. Another member asked how development is being done in other counties, if we could compare. Steve Thompson didn't see the benefit of a business right off HWY 30, when a town can provide the services they need. Discussion continued on the matter. After Primmer asking if there was enough interest into holding another meeting on the topic, the consensus was in favor. Supervisor Wiley encouraged all zoning commission members to read the land use policy. Auditor Rippel has an electronic copy she can share with those interested, as it is quite lengthy.

Allison Hicks and Jeff Young, members of the Benton County Historical Preservation Commission provided a brief review on their attendance to the National Alliance of Preservation Commission Forum 2018 held in Des Moines, Iowa in July. John Fish came to discuss traffic and maintenance concerns on 59th Street Trail, between Shellsburg and Urbana. There are safety concerns with no oil or dust control, it is just a fog he said and if nearby roads have been addressed, he feels this road should be as well. Wiley said he'd like to address highly traveled roads. The county also has a cost-sharing program for seal-coating roads. This is not the only road with dust issues, this is a big county with hundreds of miles to cover. The Engineer later reported that the traffic counts have not been updated on the DOT website yet. The board asked that he provide them as soon as they become available. They would like to get a work session scheduled regarding these problem roads when the new counts are done.

Greg Walston with Iowa State Extension and Outreach and Mike Elwick from Old School Produce came to introduce the possibility of community gardens at the Benton County Service Center's open space. Walston said he was not only here for extension office but as a community member as well. The perennials are already there and established, and they would like to continue the good work that Elwicks have done on the property. The county purchased the building from the Elwick's for office space. Walston has been meeting with other community partners for ideas what to do with a garden at the site and what to do with the produce from the garden. Possibly donating to food pantries in the area, or see what current customer base from Old School Produce will want to continue. The board asked for their approach to continue and present back at a later date with more specific details.
