**WHEREAS**, the board of supervisors must conduct an evaluation of every construction permit application using the master matrix created in Iowa Code section 459.305, but the board's recommendation to the DNR may be based on the final score on the master matrix or may be based on reasons other than the final score on the master matrix;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF BENTON COUNTY** that the Board of Supervisors hereby adopts this construction evaluation resolution pursuant to Iowa Code section 459.304(3).

Michele Sauer, Benton County Treasurer spoke up to say this wasn't a decision that was made lightly and also referred to 2002 when the state decided to cut back this service and Benton County was originally going to lose license issuance altogether. The former Treasurer Geater stepped up and took this on as additional duties so that it would continue to be available to residents. Beck thanked everyone for the time and information that he was provided that he can take back. He was also asking if there was any possibility of compromising on this which led to discussion on the staffing needs and the state issued computers used. The state supplies the station, it is not a portable unit, If the satellite station closes in Belle Plaine, that unit will then be brought back into the courthouse office and be an additional station to help serve customers 5 days a week. No action was taken. Scott Hansen brought up the need to appoint a member to the E911 Committee, with recent changes, the

Sheriff is already considered a member so they would need someone else in addition per Code Chapter 34A. Seeman moved/Bierschenk seconded: To approve the minutes of January 2, 2020. Motion carried.

They are seeking rumble strips at all county

1. That each owner and each person in the possession or control of any lands in Benton County shall cut, burn or otherwise destroy all noxious weeds thereon, as defined in this chapter, at such times in each year and in such manner as shall prevent said weeds from blooming or coming to maturity, and shall keep said lands free from such growth of any other weeds as shall render the streets or highways adjoining said land unsafe for public travel. Noxious weeds shall be cut or otherwise destroyed on or before <u>June 1, 2020</u> and as often thereafter as is necessary to prevent seed production:

2. That each owner and each person in the possession or control of any lands in Benton County infested with any of the following noxious weeds shall adopt a program of weed destruction described by the Weed Commissioner, which may be expected to destroy and will immediately keep under control such infestations of said noxious weeds.

- (a) Primary Noxious Weeds: Quackgrass, Perennial Sowthistle, Canada Thistle, Bull Thistle, Musk Thistle, European Morning Glory or Field Bindweed, Horsenettle, Leafy Spurge, Perennial Peppergrass, Russian Knapweed, Buckthorn, Tall Thistle and all other species of thistles belonging in general of Cirsium and Carduus, Palmer Amaranth.
- (b) Secondary Noxious Weeds: Butterprint, Cocklebur, Wild Mustard, Puncturevine, Teasel, Wild Carrot, Buckthorn Plantain, Sheep Sorrel, Sour Dock, Smooth Dock, Poison Hemlock, Wild Sunflower, Multiflora Rose and Shattercane.

3. That if the owners or persons in possession or control of any land in Benton County fail to comply with the foregoing orders, the Weed Commissioner or his designee shall cause this to be done and the expense of said work, including costs of serving notice and other costs, if any, shall be assessed against the real estate.

4. That the County Engineer is hereby directed to cause notice of the making and entering of the foregoing order by one publication in each of the official newspapers of the County.

Currently it is on the county's property, but is mainly used by city residents and businesses. There was concerns about the trash that accumulates.

County department heads and elected officials met to discuss COVID 19 concerns and how to continue after the Governors recommendation to be closed through May 15<sup>th</sup>, and how to proceed. Sheriff Tippett provided an update from his recent weekly meeting with Emergency Management and Public Health Board. Benton County was at 35 confirmed cases, with 20 of those being recovered. He advised to keep on doing what we're doing, we know it works and recommending the same would go for the jail. We only want safety of the clients, workers and the public. David Thompson added the courthouse isn't closed, it is just closed to the public. We're still getting work done.

Karen Phelps, Conservation Director was concerned about the public's confusion as the governor says many parks may open while Benton County remains closed. Phelps explained the measurers recommended for those who want to camp, there is a lot of restrictions now, including the use of shelters and facilities. Further concerns in regards to campers was that those visiting our campgrounds might not all be from our county, possibly out of the state whom would then come into our towns and possibly spread the virus unknowingly.

**Primmer moved/ Seeman seconded:** Based on the Benton County Public Health Board's recommendations, Benton County facilities and campgrounds will remain closed to the public until further notice. Things will remain as is, with the recommendation that Conservation get their seasonal help hired and do the proper health screening. They will revisit this topic on a regular weekly basis moving forward. Motion carried.

Benton County officials are moving forward to draft a policy for plans and procedures regarding the COVID Pandemic and how to work on getting the facilities and offices open to the public. Sheriff Ron Tippett provided an update after his most recent meeting with the director of public health for Benton County. People are still obviously encouraged to continue social distancing and using protective equipment. Scott Hansen, Emergency Management Director explained how the protective equipment he is provided can be issued.

The court system has a draft on guidance for suggestions on opening up the buildings. The court will also have to get its own protective equipment. Courts will rely on video conferencing until then. The County Attorney urged the need for a written policy that can be drafted and approved before a decision is made. He would like to see masks required. Overall everyone agreed to keeping the building as restricted as possible and how to handle screening and masks at the entrance. Everyone agreed to try and limit to one person per family if necessary to come in, calling ahead for appointments, restrooms for employees use only etc. And for those things that can be done on line to continue doing so or utilizing the drop boxes at the west entrance. Lexa Speidel, Recorder, mentioned how some counties never closed, and how neighboring counties will be opening in June. Her office was ready to open back up. Melinda Schoettmer, Treasurer outlined how her office will try and require appointments for issuing driver's licenses. This topic brought up further discussion on extending deadlines on licenses, registrations and property taxes and possibly even cancelling the tax sale. Auditor Hayley Rippel relayed how nobody can plan for such a pandemic, and how all of these things have already affected budgets and will only continue to do so moving forward. Local Option Sales Tax will probably decrease along with road use tax and not to mention the interest collections we can't collect and how this will continue to trickle down to our county level. We want to keep our employees and public all healthy, yet we have to continue getting our work done. We are being paid to do our jobs with taxpayer's dollars. Hansen and Rippel are working together looking into applying for some reimbursement and encouraged everyone to continue marking their added expenses due to COVID for easier tracking. Sanitarian and Land Use Administrator, Marc Greenlee said he sees people out in the public that a huge part of his job can't be done over the telephone or on line. Life has to go on, so we're going to assume some risks because we are employees. Supervisor Seeman would like to see employees reporting back to working in the office vs from home, but was worried about a jump in the curve as more things open up everywhere. This followed up the earlier discussion for how having one positive case get into our county courthouse, how this could shut us down completely in a hurry. If employees are required to report back to work at their offices and are at risks in terms of health, what will be required or a plan for them to continue to be able to work from home.

As for the Conservation Department, they will continue to stay at Level 1 for parks, and will discuss opening up more next week. Karen Phelps, Director of Conservation said they are monitoring at two-week intervals and also watching what other counties are doing.

Officials will continue preparing their offices and relaying their department information and suggestions to Scott Hansen who will draft a policy that can be discussed before being approved. The overall goal in mind is to get every office ready with preparations made to open back up to the public by Monday June 15, with added restrictions and proper guidelines in place. No action was formally taken but will be discussed further at next week's board meeting to allow for more time preparing the policy and to also keep an eye on the curve in Benton County.

This Agreement, is made and entered into on\_\_\_\_\_\_ 2020 by and between BENTON COMMUNITY SCHOOL DISTRICT (hereinafter "BCSD") and THE BENTON COUNTY SHERIFF DEPARTMENT, VINTON, IOWA (hereinafter "Benton Co. Sheriff Department").

WHEREAS, BCSD and the Benton Co. Sheriff Department share a mutual desire to provide law enforcement and related services to the schools in the Benton Community School District located within the communities of Atkins, Blairstown, Elberon, Keystone, Newhall, Norway, Van Horne, and Watkins to help maintain a safe environment, which will promote the safety, health, and general welfare of the students and staff, including freedom from intimidation; and

WHEREAS, BCSD and the Benton Co. Sheriff Department recognize the need for a School Resource Program (hereinafter "the SRO Program") for BCSD and the need to have one School Resource Officer (hereinafter "SRO") to work solely with BCSD, not to be shared with any other school district, in order to provide a cooperative approach toward addressing the desires of both parties; and

WHEREAS, BCSD and the Benton Co. Sheriff Department recognize the benefits of the SRO program to the citizens of Benton Community School District and particularly to the students of BCSD; and

WHEREAS, BCSD and the Benton Co. Sheriff Department wish to develop guidelines that shall clarify each entity's roles and expectations and formalizes the relationship between the participating entities to foster an efficient and cohesive SRO Program that will build a positive relationship between law enforcement officers, school staff, and the students; promote a safe and positive learning environment; and decrease the number of youth formally referred to the juvenile justice system; and

WHEREAS, it is understood that this Agreement is between two public agencies and is entered into pursuant to the provisions of Iowa Code Chapter 28E and shall be electronically filed with the Iowa Secretary of State's Office upon execution, as required by law.

THEREFORE, BCSD and the Benton Co. Sheriff Department agree to the following terms:

# ARTIC

#### A. Purpose

The purpose of this 28E Agreement is to formally establish the terms and conditions necessary to maintain an SRO Program for BCSD and for the Benton Co. Sheriff Department acting by and through the Benton Co. Sheriff Department shall assign a law enforcement officer to act as an SRO to serve in the BCSD schools and not in any other school district. Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, this 28E Agreement is not a contract which binds the Sheriff Department to provide any other services to BCSD. No special duty or duty act is created by this Agreement.

### B. <u>Mission</u>

The mission of the SRO Program is to promote school safety by building a positive school climate in which everyone feels safe and students are supported to succeed. The SRO Program also seeks to reduce violent crime committed by and against youth in our community. The SRO Program accomplishes this mission by supporting safe, secure, and orderly learning environments for students, teachers, and staff. SROs will establish a trusting channel of communication with students, parents, and teachers and establish regular feedback opportunities. The role of the SRO is not to enforce school discipline or punish students. SROs will serve as positive role models to instill in students good moral standards, good judgment and discretion, respect for other students, and a sincere concern for the school community. SROs will provide information on community resources available to students and parents. Goals and objectives are designed to develop and enhance rapport between youth, families, police officers, school administrators,

and the community in order to promote overall student achievement and success.

## C. Goals

The goals of the SRO Program are the following:

- (1) To ensure a safe learning environment for all children and adults who enter the building.
- (2) To prevent and reduce potential harm related to incidents of school violence.
- (3) To foster a positive school climate based on respect for all children and adults in the school.
- (4) To create partnerships with behavioral health and other care providers in the community for student and family referral.

ARTIC LE II

The duration of this Agreement shall be for two years, and the SRO Program for BCSD shall run from July 1, 2020 until June 30, 2022.

### ARTICLE III DUTIES OF THE BENTON CO. SHERIFF DEPARTMENT

The Benton Co. Sheriff Department, acting as a department of Benton County, Iowa, agrees to provide the following:

### A. <u>Selection of the SRO</u>

The Benton Co. Sheriff Department shall recruit employee candidates to serve in the SRO position. Administration from BCSD may participate in the interview process and make a recommendation to the Benton Co. Sheriff Department regarding candidates for the SRO position. Ultimately, because the SRO is an employee of the Benton Co. Sheriff Department, the Benton Co. Sheriff Department, will make the final decision regarding the candidate to be hired for the SRO position. However, the candidate hired is still subject to the approval by BCSD's Board of Directors of the employee's assignment to work at BCSD, as outlined below.

The SRO should generally meet the following criteria:

- 1. A 2-year or 4-year college degree in a relevant field would be beneficial and preferred.
- 2. A minimum of 2 years of experience as a field police officer with experience with juvenile assignments is required.
- 3. Prior successful performance in the area of juvenile assignments is required.
- 4. Prior to beginning service as an SRO, \_\_\_\_\_hours of relevant training, at the expense of the Benton Co. Sheriff Department, is required.

## B. Assignment of the SRO

The Benton Co. Sheriff Department shall assign one regularly employed full-time deputy officer to BCSD to act as an SRO for BCSD. This assignment shall be subject to the approval of BCSD's Board of Directors.

## C. Employment and Supervision

 The Benton Co. Sheriff Department shall, at all times, operate as the employer of the SRO, and the SRO shall, at all times, be an employee of the Benton Co. Sheriff Department. The SRO shall not be an employee or agent of BCSD. The Benton Co. Sheriff Department and BCSD acknowledge that the SRO is a law enforcement officer who shall endeavor to uphold the law under the direct supervision and control of the Benton Co. Sheriff Department. The SRO shall remain responsive to the chain of command of the Benton Co. Sheriff Department. Nothing herein shall be construed as giving BCSD the right to control the professional judgment or actions of the SRO.

- 2. The Benton Co. Sheriff Department shall be solely responsible for paying the SRO. The Benton Co. Sheriff Department shall provide and pay for all required employee benefits, withhold income tax and social security tax, and shall provide for the benefits required by Iowa Code Chapter 411 for the SRO. The SRO shall not be entitled to participate in any benefit plans offered by BCSD.
- 3. The Benton Co. Sheriff Department shall be solely responsible for providing and paying for all required and/or recommended testing and/or training for the SRO. The Benton Co. Sheriff Department shall provide BCSD Superintendent with a schedule for testing and training of the SRO as early as possible before the beginning of the school year.
- 4. The Benton Co. Sheriff Department shall assign an individual to directly supervise the officer assigned to the SRO program (hereinafter "the SRO supervisor"). The Benton Co. Sheriff Department shall provide BCSD the name of the SRO supervisor no later than July 15 for each year of this Agreement and within thirty (30) days of the SRO supervisor changing.
- 5. In addition to providing training and direction for the SRO, the SRO supervisor will serve as a liaison between the Benton Co. Sheriff Department and BCSD in order to resolve matters of mutual concern.
- 6. The SRO supervisor, in consultation with a designated BCSD representative, will complete performance evaluations for the SRO during May of each year. BCSD shall provide the Benton Co. Sheriff Department the name of the designated BCSD representative no later than July 15 for each year of this Agreement and whenever the designated BCSD representative changes. The SRO supervisor, however, shall be the final arbiter of all decisions with respect to said evaluation.
- 7. However, while in BCSD buildings or on BCSD grounds, the SRO will be further accountable to the building principal or his/her designee. The SRO will be expected to cooperate with the building principal and other BCSD officials. The SRO will be expected to respond to the reasonable request of BCSD officials. The SRO will be expected to follow all applicable BCSD policies and procedures.

## D. Regular Duty Hours of the School Resource Officer

The SRO shall be assigned to BCSD school buildings and grounds on a full-time basis of eight (8) hours each day when school is in regular session. The SRO shall typically be on one of the BCSD campuses from ½ hour prior to the start of class until ½ hour after classes are dismissed, but has discretion to adjust starting and ending times to maintain a forty (40) hour work week. The SRO will

occasionally receive adjusted hours by the Superintendent (or designee) or Associate Superintendent (or designee) of BCSD if evening events and activities are taking place and the SRO is needed or if exceptional situations exist and the SRO is needed.

- 2. The SRO shall be assigned to BCSD school buildings and grounds as determined appropriate when school is not in regular session. Summer hours may be adjusted for evening or weekend activities or events. Summer hours may also entail work on curriculum, safety assessments, developing plans for the school year safety and active shooter training and leadership of such, and drills/practices with staff and students. The Benton Co. Sheriff Department may temporarily re-assign the SRO during school holidays and vacations, training activities, and periods of police emergencies and other occasions as agreed upon by the Superintendent or his/her designee and the Benton Co. Sheriff Department.
- The Benton Co. Sheriff Department shall make every effort to re-assign a qualified substitute employee to cover the SRO's duties should the assigned SRO be unavailable for a period greater than one (1) day.

## E. Uniform, Equipment, and Vehicle of the Student Resource Officer

The Benton Co. Sheriff Department shall supply all necessary and appropriate uniforms, equipment, vehicle(s), and vehicle equipment required by the SRO to perform his/her duties. All uniforms, equipment, vehicle(s), and

vehicle equipment purchased by the Benton Co. Sheriff Department for the SRO to perform his or her duties shall be the property of the Sheriff Department. All equipment purchased by BCSD for use by the SRO will be the property of BCSD.

### F. Duties of the School Resource Officer

The primary functions of the SRO are to help provide a safe and secure learning environment, foster a positive school climate, reduce/prevent crime, serve as an educational resource, and serve as a liaison between BCSD and the Benton Co. Sheriff Department. Specific daily assignments to accomplish this function will vary by school building.

The SRO and the BCSD Superintendent or designee will meet on a regular basis to discuss plans and strategies to address specific issues or needs that may arise.

The basic responsibilities and duties of the SRO may include but will not be limited to the following:

- 1. The SRO shall coordinate the SRO's activities directly with the BCSD Superintendent, the building principals or their designees, and the SRO supervisor.
- Except as excused by other terms of this Agreement or with the consent of the SRO supervisor, the SRO shall be present at the assigned BCSD school during times of high activity, such as the beginning and end of each school day and lunch periods.
- 3. The SRO shall coordinate his/her non-law enforcement activities with the BCSD administration or the principal or a faculty member of the school or schools concerned and shall seek permission, advice, and guidance from the proper BCSD administrators or staff prior to enacting any programs within the school/s to ensure all programs stay within BCSD policies and guidelines.
- 4. The SRO shall provide instruction for specialized short-term programs at the BCSD schools when a member of the school administration or staff has invited the SRO to do so and the program has been approved by the SRO supervisor.
- 5. The SRO shall make presentations and provide instruction on various subjects to students such as a basic understanding of the laws, drugs and alcohol prevention, the roles of sheriffs, deputies, police officers, and police mission.
- 6. The SRO shall encourage individual and small group discussions with students to establish rapport with the students.
- 7. When requested by a principal or other administrator, the SRO shall attend parent/faculty meetings to encourage support and understanding of the SRO program.
- 8. The SRO shall be available for conferences with students, parents, and faculty members in order to address and assist with problems of a law enforcement or crime prevention in nature. The SRO shall not disclose confidential information obtained pursuant to an investigation except as provided by law or a court order.
- 9. The SRO shall become familiar with community agencies that offer assistance to students and their families, including, but not limited to, mental health and substance abuse treatment facilities. The SRO shall act as a resource officer to the students, families, faculty, and staff and shall make referrals to these agencies as needed.
- 10. The SRO shall work with the administration and faculty of BCSD to develop plans and strategies to prevent and/or minimize the threat of harm that may result from student unrest.
- 11. The SRO, in coordination with the Superintendent and the Benton Co. Sheriff Department, shall

develop a Diversion/Restitution Plan and process for working directly with students who have violated the law, have been referred to BCSD by other agencies, or are on the verge of engaging in high risk behavior.

- 12. The SRO, in coordination with the Superintendent and the Benton Co. Sheriff Department, shall coordinate School Crisis and Safety Planning and training, including the creation of a School Safety Plan and the coordination of appropriate school safety drills.
- 13. The SRO shall take law enforcement action as necessary in the exercise of the SRO's discretion as a law enforcement officer. As soon as practical, the SRO shall make the principal or the Superintendent aware of such action. Whenever practical, the SRO shall advise the principal or the Superintendent before requesting additional police assistance on campus. If the use of force or an arrest becomes necessary, the SRO shall follow all applicable federal and state law, rules, and regulations and policies, as well as the rules and regulations of the Benton Co. Sheriff Department.
- 14. The SRO shall, at the request of the principal or the Superintendent, take appropriate law enforcement action against intruders or unwanted guests who may appear on school grounds, at a school building, or at a school function, to the extent permitted by law. The SRO shall advise the principal of any additional police presence or assistance on campus after the incident or as time allows.
- 15. The SRO shall, at the request of the building principal or the Superintendent, conduct investigations relating to BCSD students, staff, or assigned facilities. The SRO shall inform the appropriate BCSD administrator or principal as soon as possible regarding the need for any such investigation.
- 16. The SRO shall determine whether it is necessary to conduct formal police interviews with students. The SRO shall inform the principal or the Superintendent as soon as possible of any such interviews. The SRO shall adhere to school board policy, sheriff department policy, and all Federal, State, and local laws, should it become necessary for the SRO to conduct interviews with students.
- 17. The SRO shall attend and participate in BCSD activities when possible and when approved by the Superintendent or designee.
- 18. The SRO shall cooperate and give assistance to other law enforcement officers (both from the Benton Co. Sheriff Department and the Vinton Police Department and from other agencies) and government agencies in matters regarding his or her school assignment whenever the need arises.
- 19. The SRO shall conduct such other non-law enforcement activities as agreed to by the Benton Co. Sheriff Department and the BCSD Superintendent.
- 20. The SRO shall maintain detailed and accurate records of his/her activities, and provide a written monthly report to the BCSD Superintendent and the Benton Co. Sheriff Department. This activity report shall be for statistical purposes only and will not contain any confidential arrest, intelligence, or student information.
- 21. The SRO shall collaborate with BCSD to collect date on time spent on select activities and perception data from students, staff, and if applicable, parents.
- 22. The SRO shall respect the confidential nature of student information and shall abide by all state and federal laws, all policies and procedures of the Benton Co. Sheriff Department, and the policies and procedures of BCSD relating to student information. The SRO will not release information he/she has acquired unless specifically permitted pursuant to state and federal law, the policies and procedures of the Benton Co. Sheriff Department, and the policies and procedures of BCSD.
- 23. BCSD shall retain full responsibility for disciplining students. The SRO shall not act as a disciplinarian. However, in the event BCSD believes that there has been a violation of the law, the SRO may be contacted, and the SRO shall work with the building principal and the SRO supervisor to determine

whether law enforcement action is appropriate.

- 24. The SRO will work in business, casual business, or uniform attire when on duty as prescribed by the Benton Co. Sheriff Department. Exceptions would be during special events or circumstances at which time the SRO may be expected to be in uniform. The SRO shall carry a regulation sidearm in accordance with the Benton Co. Sheriff Department guidelines.
- 25. The SRO shall perform other duties as mutually agreed upon by the parties. However, the performance of any such duties should be reasonable related to the SRO Program as described in this Agreement and shall be consistent with federal, state, and local laws, Sheriff Department rules and regulations, and BCSD policies, rules and regulations. The Benton Co. Sheriff Department shall meet with designed BCSD administration to resolve any and all questions arising under this paragraph.

### ARTICLE IV DUTIES OF THE BENTON COMMUNITY SCHOOL DISTRICT

The Benton Community School District, agrees to provide the following:

### A. <u>Materials and Facilities</u>

BCSD shall provide the SRO with the following materials and facilities, which are deemed necessary to the performance of the SRO's duties:

- 1. Access to an office equipped with air-conditioning, proper lighting, and a desk telephone that will be used for business purposes.
- 2. A location to store files and records which can be properly locked and secured.
- 3. A desk with drawers, a chair, work table, filing cabinet, office supplies, and a cell phone to use in the course of the SRO's duties. All office supplies, including a cell phone, provided by BCSE for the SRO shall be the property of BCSD. Therefore, upon termination of this Agreement, all equipment provided to the SRO by BCSD as a part of this Agreement shall be retained by BCSD.
- 4. Access to a computer and/or secretarial support.
- 5. Guidance with regard to any instruction or programming to be delivered or presented by the SRO.

### ARTICLE V FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS

The parties agree to the following regarding their financial obligations related to this Agreement:

### A. Employment of and Payment of Salary to School Resource Officer

As outlined above, the Benton Co. Sheriff Department shall, at all times, operate as the employer of the SRO, and the SRO shall, at all times, be an employee of the Benton Co. Sheriff Department. As such, and as outlined above, the Benton Co. Sheriff Department shall be solely responsible for paying the SRO for any work performed in the SRO's role as an SRO.

## B. <u>Reimbursement by BCSD to Benton Co. Sheriff Department</u>

For the duration of this Agreement (from July 1, 2020, through June 30, 2022), BCSD agrees to reimburse the Benton Co. Sheriff Department for the annual salary cost for the SRO. The parties agree that the annual salary cost for the SRO effective July 1, 2020, shall be \$\_\_\_\_\_.

The parties agree that, if either the Benton Co. Sheriff Department or BCSD receive any grant funds that may be applied to the SRO position and/or this Agreement, said funds will be applied to the annual salary cost prior to reimbursement by BCSD and shall act to reduce the amount of the annual salary cost

reimbursed by BCSD.

The Benton Co. Sheriff Department shall submit four (4) quarterly invoices to BCSD for payment of the quarterly salary cost (which is calculated by dividing the annual salary cost by four). The Benton Co. Sheriff Department shall itemize the salary and taxes on each invoice. BCSD shall promptly pay each invoice, after any necessary Board approval.

The Benton Co. Sheriff Department and BCSD shall each maintain their own individual budgets with regard to their financial obligations under this agreement.

### ARTICLE VI DISCIPLINE AND/OR REPLACEMENT OF THE SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER

In the event that BCSD believes that the SRO is not effectively performing his or her duties or that any other disciplinary action needs to be taken with regard to the SRO, the appropriate BCSD administrator or designee shall do the following:

- 1. Contact the SRO supervisor in order to provide the Benton Co. Sheriff Department with an opportunity to resolve the matter internally.
- 2. If the matter is not resolved in a reasonable amount of time, BCSD may provide a written request for disciplinary action to be imposed upon and/or the removal of the SRO to the SRO Supervisor on behalf of the Benton Co. Sheriff Department. That request must provide a detailed reason or reasons that the request is being made.
- 3. Upon receipt of BCSD's request, the Benton Co. Sheriff Department will consider the request and make a proposal regarding an appropriate response to the concerns outlined in the request. The Benton Co. Sheriff Department will provide the proposal to BCSD within a reasonable amount of time after receipt of the request.
- 4. If the parties cannot reach an agreement on the proposal to resolve the request provided by BCSD, the parties may attempt to mediate a resolution.
- 5. Additionally, as a resolution to the request, the Benton Co. Sheriff Department may reassign the SRO to another position within the Benton Co. Sheriff Department consistent with Department rules, regulations, and/or operations order and only when it is in the best interest of BCSD and the Benton Co. Sheriff Department to do so.
- 6. In the event that the SRO is reassigned, resigns, or has a long absence, the Benton Co. Sheriff Department shall consult with BCSD to assign a temporary replacement for the SRO within one week of receiving notice of the reassignment resignation, or absence. The Benton Co. Sheriff Department will work jointly with BCSD to interview and select a permanent replacement as soon as practical and consistent with the procedures outlined in this Agreement.

Nothing in this Article affects the rights of either party to terminate this Agreement pursuant to the procedures outlined herein.

### ARTICLE VII MISCELLANEO US

## A. Each Party Responsible for Their Own Acts

Each party shall be responsible and liable for the consequences of any act or failure to act on the part of itself and its employees. Each party shall be responsible for its own negligence and that of its officers and employees. Neither party shall indemnify nor hold the other party harmless. Neither party will insure the actions of the other.

## B. Good Faith

BCSD, the Benton Co. Sheriff Department, their agents, officers, and employees agree to cooperate in good faith in fulfilling the terms of this Agreement. Unforeseen difficulties or questions will be resolved by negotiation between BCSD and the Benton Co. Sheriff Department, or their designees.

## C. Insurance and Indemnification

To the extent permitted by law, each party will indemnify and hold harmless the other party from and against an and all losses, costs, damages, claims, and expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees and expenses, occasional by or arising from the negligence or willful misconduct of itself and its agents, representatives, administrators, officers, deputies, and/or employees. Each party shall be responsible for the action or failure to take action by itself and its agenda, representatives, administrators, officers, and/or employees. Neither party shall insure the actions of the other party.

### D. Full Understanding

This Agreement constitutes the full understanding of the parties, and no terms, conditions, understandings or agreement purporting to modify or vary the terms of this Agreement shall be binding unless hereafter made in writing and signed by both parties.

Further, this Agreement constitutes a final written expression of all of these terms of this Agreement and is a complete and exclusive statement of those terms.

## E. Modification of Agreement

This Agreement shall not be modified except by written agreement signed by both parties.

## F. <u>Termination of Agreement</u>

This Agreement may be terminated by either party, upon thirty (30) days written notice. In the event that this Agreement is terminated, compensation shall be made to the Benton Co. Sheriff Department for all services performed through the date of termination, under the terms set forth in this Agreement.

### G. <u>Notices</u>

Any written notices as required in this Agreement shall be sent to the addresses of the respective parties as set out in this Agreement.

Notices for the Benton Co. Sheriff Department shall be delivered to: Sheriff/SRO

## H. Additional Provision Pursuant to Iowa Code Section 28E.6

In accordance with Iowa Code Chapter 28E, BCSD and the Benton Co. Sheriff Department further state:

1. There shall be no separate legal entity to conduct the joint or cooperative undertaking contemplated by this Agreement. The Benton Co. Sheriff Department, acting on behalf of Benton County, shall act as administrator for purposes of Iowa Code Chapter 28E.

- No real or personal property shall be acquired or held jointly in the execution of this Agreement or the conduct of the SRO Program contemplated hereby. Rather, BCSD and the Benton Co. Sheriff Department shall each acquire, hold, and dispose of all real and personal property as elsewhere provided in this Agreement.
- 3. Pursuant to Iowa Code Section 28E.8, the Benton Co. Sheriff Department shall file this Agreement with the Iowa Secretary of State, in an electronic format and in a manner specified by the secretary of state.
- 4. This Agreement is by and between the parties only. There are no third-party beneficiaries to this Agreement.

The time of 9:15 a.m. having arrived, and this being the time and date for a land use hearing for Brandon and Jennica Jordan in part of Parcel E in the SW <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> NE <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> of 27-85-9. No members of the media were present. Jordan's were both present, along with five property owners that have land adjacent to the parcel under review. Marc Greenlee presented the technical information with the Benton County Agricultural Land Use Preservation Ordinance. Jordan's would like to propose a change of 2 acres into non-ag use for a wedding venue that would have the capacity for up to 250 guests year-round. The parent parcel is 11.1 acres and is currently owned by Beau Chene Inc. The venue would be south of where the Jordan's residence is. CSR is 68 with the land in production being alfalfa. The location is approximately 3.5 miles north of Shellsburg along hard surface. The existing driveway does meet requirements, however in the event that it gets changed, it will have to be reconfigured to have 6:1 side slopes. Jordan's plant to glant vegetative barriers where practical. This location will need a new well and septic. The required notification was sent to the adjacent landowner's and published in the official newspapers. No responses or concerns have been expressed prior to today's hearing.

Neighbor Dennis Manley was the first to speak up in opposition to the land use change. Manley had concerns about an access road, and the noise and lights that would be on the property and the traffic. Other neighbors in the area also spoke up about their concerns of how this could change the dynamic of the whole area and how farm ground should be preserved. Talk of alcohol and loud music and how this will be controlled. Jordan assured them this is not going to be a college hangout, but a wedding venue. "It is the world we live in, people are building everywhere and we want to build this for ourselves and the community." Supervisor Primmer pointed out this board recently approved a venue north of Vinton that is close to residential areas. He doesn't see this being any different than that. Primmer also stressed these venues can bring in additional revenue to the county. He is pro-business and pro-development. Supervisor Seeman asked if there wouldn't be.

Hearing no other further comments, the public hearing was closed.

Seeman made a motion, and Supervisor Bierschenk spoke up with some questions about the distance between the venue and the neighbors. Not hearing a second from Bierschenk, Primmer seconded the motion to approve the land use change for Brandon and Jennica Jordan in part of Parcel E in the SW ¼ NE ¼ of 27-85-9.Voting aye were Seeman and Primmer. The time of 9:00 a.m. was scheduled for a public hearing for the states of funded activities for the lowa Watershed Approach Project of Benton County, Iowa as assisted by the Community Development Block Grant-National Disaster Resiliency (CDBG-NDR) program. Tom Gruis, East Central Iowa Council of Government Grant Administrator presented the requirements needed. Adam Rodenberg, WMA coordinator was also present. No members of the public were in attendance, and no comments or concerns were heard before this hearing.

As required for this hearing, it is noted that:

- a. For a general description of accomplishments to date, it is noted that the following has been completed: a watershed management plan has been completed; the following agricultural best management practices (BMPs) have been completed: 11 ponds and wetlands, 21 water and sediment control basis, 4 grassed waterways, 1 stream buffer, 7 grade stabilization structures, and 2 terraces; the first construction bid packet has been completed and signed off.
- <u>b.</u> For a summary of expenditures to-date, through June 30, 2020, a total of \$5,605,467 has been invoiced: \$1,959,657 for construction; \$3,999,199 for engineering and other technical services, such as land acquisition, appraisals, archeology, etc.; \$284,901 for the project coordinator and related activities; \$864,576 for flood modelling; \$277,717 for the watershed management plan and related activities; \$179,074 for grant administration. From a grant of \$11,168,559, project costs are reimbursed at 100%; however, landowners are matching 10% of the construction costs for BMPs. These funds are used to support the project.
- c. For a general description of remaining work, it is noted that the following is needed: construct more BMPs, mainly ponds and/or wetlands, with the number to be determined by funds available and actual costs of practices bid in the future; complete the contracted, not-yet-built BMPs in the \$5,313,886 contracted so far. An additional 6-10 ponds and/or wetland projects will be bid in fall 2020 depending on Environmental Review and remaining funds available
- d. For a general description of changes made to the project budget, performance targets, activity schedules, project scope, location, objectives or beneficiaries, it is noted that three HUC-12 watersheds were added to the eligible area for BMP installation; the federal cost share amount was increased from 75% to 90 % to promote landowner participation; and the project completion deadline was extended from 9/30/2021 to 12/31/2021.

#### BENTON COUNTY AND LINN COUNTY 28E PROJECT AGREEMENT

This agreement entered into this 10<sup>th</sup> day of November, by and between Linn County, Iowa, hereinafter referred to as Linn County, and Benton County, Iowa hereinafter referred to as Benton County.

WHEREAS, both Linn County and Benton County are a public agency as is defined by Section 28E.2 of the Code of Iowa, and

WHEREAS, Section 28E.3 of the Code of Iowa provides that any power or powers, privileges or authority exercised or capable of exercise by a public agency of the State of Iowa may be exercised and enjoyed jointly by a public agency of the State of Iowa having such power or powers, and

WHEREAS, it is proposed, that Linn County plan, design and let for bidding a construction project to regrade shared portions of Linn-Benton Road, and

WHEREAS, the Linn County Board of Supervisors and the Benton County Board of Supervisors have informed themselves as to the proposed improvement.

IT IS NOW AGREED that Benton County and Linn County enter into an agreement pursuant to Chapter 28E of the Code of Iowa providing for cooperative action pursuant to the proposed roadway construction project and, said cooperative actions include the following:

- SCOPE OF WORK Design, let and construct improvements to Linn-Benton Road per plans and specifications produced by the Linn County Engineer. Work is to include culvert replacements, widen the roadtop, flatten the foreslopes, rock surfacing, staking, inspection, and other items to complete the project.
- 2) DURATION This Agreement shall commence on the date that both parties sign this agreement and shall continue thereafter until the final completion of the project and settlement of the financial conditions of this agreement.
- PURPOSE The purpose of this Agreement is to accomplish the proposed project as described herein in accordance with the aforesaid scope of work and in agreement with conditions specified in this Agreement.
- 4) ADMINISTRATION Linn County shall be responsible for the administration of this project.
- 5) Benton County and Linn County agree to save and indemnify and keep harmless, each other against all liabilities, judgments, costs, and expenses which may in any way come against Linn County or Benton County or which in any way result from carelessness or neglect of either party or its agents, employees, or workmen in any respect whatsoever.
- 6) Benton County and Linn County agree to indemnify and hold each other, their employees and agents, wholly harmless from any damages, claims, demands, or suits by any person or persons arising out of any acts or omissions by Benton County or Linn County, its agents, servants or employees in the course of any work done in connection with any of the matters set forth in this agreement.
- 7) FINANCING Linn County shall initially finance the cost of the project. Benton County shall reimburse Linn County for the actual cost of construction plus 7.5% administration fees (design, inspection, plan preparation, etc.) based on proposed plans and attached project estimate for the portion of the project within their corporate limits as they exist at the time the project is complete. Payment shall be made within 30 days of receipt of detailed invoice.

#### 8) TERMINATION: -

a) This Agreement shall be considered binding upon Benton County and Linn County and shall not be terminated until provisions of paragraph 8b are met after actual work has begun on the project.

b) This agreement will be terminated upon final acceptance of the work by Benton County and final settlement of the financial conditions set forth in paragraph 7 thereof.

Members of the public were provided the zoom access capability to join in during open session and watch live at the county's YouTube channel. *Unless otherwise noted, all actions were approved unanimously.* 

Seeman moved/Bierschenk seconded: To approve the minutes of Tuesday, December 8, 2020. Motion carried.

Mona Krugger, Utilization Review Coordinator for the MH/DS asked about the county vehicle. It is normally parked in Independence. With the cold and snow, Krugger wanted to inform the board she would be driving the vehicle periodically to Vinton so that the battery doesn't die. The Board agreed this was a good idea.

Laurie Worden, Kirkwood Workplace Learning Connection, provided an overview on the various activities throughout the year. Despite Covid-19 concerns, job shadowing had increased. Grades 6-12<sup>th</sup> students are exposed to work-based learning through a variety of activities. FY 22 budget request of \$2566.00, based on the per-capita is the same as last year. Worden also announced her retirement in August, and will be getting in touch with officials to introduce her replacement.

Seeman moved/Bierschenk seconded: To approve Utility permit for Interstate Power & Light in Leroy/St. Clair Township along 22<sup>nd</sup> Ave. Motion carried.

Seeman moved/Bierschenk seconded: To approve Utility permit for East Central Iowa REC in Homer/Big Grove Townships. Motion carried.

Wayne Siela, discussed the dirt road for 61<sup>st</sup> Street between 24<sup>th</sup> Ave. on East of Hwy 218. Siela and others would like to see a farm to market road be put there. He said it would be safer than the county home road for hauling grain and moving farm equipment. This would also reduce heavy ag traffic off the road next to the schools. Siela presented letters of support from representatives from the local school, Farm Bureau, Farm Service, Tame-Benton Coop. The Iowa Corn Growers Association, local banks, township trustees and other area farmers. The Board agreed, something needs to be done, and estimates would be needed to keep this in motion.

Supervisor Primmer said the board understands this is something that needs attention, but the city of Vinton may need involved also. The Engineer Myron Parizek was also present for the conversation. He explained how the farm to market system is identified and financed. They all agreed this is a need, but will need to be researched and get estimates before moving forward.

Tracey Achenbach, East Central Iowa Housing presented the FY 22 request for funding commitment of \$3,850. This is a slight increase from last year. Achenbach shared, that since the program has started, it has benefited 103 houses.

Ryan Bervin, Group Benefit Partners presented the Iowa State Association of Counties (ISAC) renewal rates effective July 1, 2021. Group Benefit Partners, took over ISAC partnership with Kingston Life. The County didn't have good wellness participation this year, therefore rates did increase 12% if staying with the same plan. Bervin presented the Board a couple options that they have time to look over and decide. ISAC also transitioned current Voluntary Accidental Death and Dismemberment benefits from Chubb to Reliance Standard. Group Benefit Partners will also be the benefits consultant for this. Employees will need this information turned back in ASAP.

The Board discussed tax abatement for the City of Shellsburg. Larry Andreesen, Assessor was also present for the discussion. The action was tabled until next week and a resolution will be prepared.

The time of 9:15 a.m. having arrived, and this being the time and date for a land use hearing for Billy and Dawn Phillips a part of Parcel B in the NE ½ NW ¼ & NW ½ NE ¼ Sec 33 T86N R10W. Marc Greenlee presented the technical information with the Benton County Agricultural Land Use Preservation Ordinance. Phillips are requesting to change land use for the purpose of building a new residence. A 50X100 shed, and utilizing some existing buildings on the property for storage trucks and equipment associated with their garbage business-EZ Trash. Part of this acreage has existing buildings, and part is currently hay ground. The CSR is 25, and the soil is a loamy fine sand. Randy Sherwood has submitted his report and visited about the driveway situation out there. There are (2) existing driveways now, one would definitely need replaced or removed since it does not meet sight distance. The sight will need a new septic and well.
