ORDINANCE #76 AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING THE COUNTY SUPERVISOR DISTRICTS AND ELECTION PRECINCTS

BE IT ENACTED by the Board of Supervisors of Benton County, Iowa:

Section 1. Purpose: The purpose of this ordinance is to establish election precincts and county supervisor districts as the result of the population changes reflected by the 2020 federal decennial census, and in accordance with Iowa Code Sections 331.210A and 49.7.

Section 2. Boundaries of Election precincts

A. The boundaries of election precincts containing unincorporated areas of Benton County and cities withpopulations of less than 2010 shall be as follows:

BENTON-CANTON-SHELLSBURG: All of Benton Township, all of Canton Township, and all of the City of Shellsburg

BRUCE-CEDAR-MT AUBURN: All of Bruce Township, all of Cedar Township, and all of the City of Mt.

BIG GROVE-UNION-VAN HORNE: All of Big Grove Township, all of Union Township, and all of the City of Van Horne

EDEN-HARRISON-TAYLOR: All of Eden Township, all of Harrison Township, and all of TaylorTownship

ELDORADO-NEWHALL: All of Eldorado Township and all of the City of Newhall

FLORENCE-ST CLAIR-NORWAY: All of Florence Township, all of St Clair Township, and all of the City of Norway

FREMONT-ATKINS: All of Fremont Township and all of the City of Atkins

HOMER-MONROE-JACKSON-GARRISON: All of Homer Township, All of Monroe Township, all ofJackson Township, and all of the City of Garrison

IOWA-LEROY-LUZERNE-BLAIRSTOWN: All of Iowa Township, all of Leroy Township, all of the City of Luzerne, and all of the City of Blairstown

KANE-KEYSTONE: All of Kane Township and all of the City of Keystone

POLK-URBANA: All of Polk Township and all of the City of Urbana

B. Additional Election Precincts: The city councils of Belle Plaine, Vinton, and Walford have establishedtheir own election precinct plans.

Section 3. Boundaries of Supervisor Districts.

A. Supervisor District #1

Supervisor District #1 is made up of all of the following townships and cities in Benton County, Iowa:

Harrison Township, Polk Township, Taylor Township, and the cities of Urbana and Vinton.

The total population of Supervisor District #1 according to the 2020 federal decennial census is 8,541.

B. Supervisor District #2

Supervisor District #2 is made up of all of the following townships and cities in Benton County, Iowa:

Bruce Township, Cedar Township, Jackson Township, Big Grove Township, Eden Township, Benton Township, Canton Township, Eldorado Township, Fremont Township and the cities of Mt Auburn, Garrison, Shellsburg, Atkins and Newhall.

The total population of Supervisor District #2 according to the 2020 federal decennial census is 8,582.

C. Supervisor District #3

Supervisor District #3 is made up of the following townships and cities in Benton County, Iowa:

Florence Township, St Clair Township, Leroy Township, Iowa Township, Union Township, Kane Township, Homer Township, Monroe Township and the cities of Norway, Blairstown, Luzerne, Belle Plaine, Keystone, Van Horne and the portion of Walford lying in Benton County.

The total population of Supervisor District #3 according to the 2020 federal decennial census is 8,452.

Section 4. Effective Date.

This ordinance shall be effective on January 15, 2022, after its final passage, approval, and publication asprovided by law.

Section 5. Repealer.

All ordinance or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 6. Severability Clause.

If any section, provision, or part of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any section, provision or part thereof not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

Davidson & Co. (the "Underwriter");

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Benton County, Iowa, as follows:

Section 1.The County Auditor is hereby authorized to take such action as shall be deemed necessary and appropriate with the assistance of the Underwriter and Dorsey & Whitney LLP (the "Disclosure Counsel"), as the City's disclosure counsel, to prepare the P.O.S. describing the Bonds and providing for the terms and conditions of their sale, and all action heretofore taken in this regard is hereby ratified and approved.

Section 2. The use by the Underwriter of the P.O.S. relating to the Bonds in substantially the form as has been presented to and considered by the Board is hereby approved, and Disclosure Counsel and the Underwriter are hereby authorized to prepare and use a final Official Statement for the Bonds substantially in the form of the P.O.S. but with such changes therein as are required to conform the same to the terms of the Bonds and the resolution, when adopted, providing for the sale and issuance of the Bonds, and the County Auditor is hereby authorized and directed to execute a final Official Statement for the Bonds, if requested. The P.O.S. as of its date is deemed final by the County within the meaning of Rule 15(c)(2)-12 of the Securities and Exchange Commission.

Section 3.Further action with respect to the Loan Agreement is hereby adjourned to the Board meeting on February 8, 2022.

Section 4.All resolutions or parts thereof in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Section 5.This resolution shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its adoption and approval, as provided by law.

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Benton County, Iowa, as follows:

Section 1.The County shall enter into the Loan Agreement with the Underwriter, in substantially the form as has been placed on file with the Board, providing for a loan to the County in the principal amount of \$5,025,000, for the purpose or purposes set forth in the preamble hereof.

The Chairperson and County Auditor are hereby authorized and directed to sign the Loan Agreement on behalf of the County, and the Loan Agreement is hereby approved.

Section 2. The Bonds are hereby authorized to be issued in evidence of the obligation of the County under the Loan Agreement, in the total aggregate principal amount of \$5,025,000, to be dated March 15, 2022, in the denomination of \$5,000 each, or any integral multiple thereof, maturing on June 1 in each of the years, in the respective principal amounts and bearing interest at the respective rates, as follows:

BOKF, N.A., Lincoln, Nebraska, Iowa, is hereby designated as the Registrar and Paying Agent for the Bonds and may be hereinafter referred to as the "Registrar" or the "Paying Agent." The County shall enter into an agreement (the "Registrar/Paying Agent Agreement") with the Registrar, in substantially the form as has been placed on file with the Board; the Chairperson and County Auditor are hereby authorized and directed to sign the Registrar/Paying Agent Agreement on behalf of the County; and the Registrar/Paying Agent Agreement is hereby approved.

The Bonds are not subject to optional redemption prior to maturity.

Accrued interest on the Bonds shall be payable semiannually on the first day of June and December in each year, commencing December 1, 2022. Interest shall be calculated on the basis of a 360-day year comprised of twelve 30-day months. Payment of interest on the Bonds shall be made to the registered owners appearing on the registration books of the County at the close of business on the fifteenth day of the month next preceding the interest payment date and shall be paid to the registered owners at the addresses shown on such registration books. Principal of the Bonds shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America to the registered owners or their legal representatives upon presentation and surrender of the Bond or Bonds at the office of the Paying Agent.

The Bonds shall be executed on behalf of the County with the official manual or facsimile signature of the Chairperson and attested with the official manual or facsimile signature of the County Auditor and shall be fully registered Bonds without interest coupons. In case any officer whose signature or the facsimile of whose signature appears on the Bonds shall cease to be such officer before the delivery of the Bonds, such signature or such facsimile signature shall nevertheless be valid and sufficient for all purposes, the same as if such officer had remained in office until delivery.

The Bonds shall not be valid or become obligatory for any purpose until the Certificate of Authentication thereon shall have been signed by the Registrar.

The Bonds shall be fully registered as to principal and interest in the names of the owners on the registration books of the County kept by the Registrar, and after such registration, payment of the principal thereof and interest thereon shall be made only to the registered owners or their legal representatives or assigns. Each Bond shall be transferable only upon the registration books of the County upon presentation to the Registrar, together with either a written instrument of transfer satisfactory to the Registrar or the assignment form thereon completed and duly executed by the registered owner or the duly authorized attorney for such registered owner.

The record and identity of the owners of the Bonds shall be kept confidential as provided by Section 22.7 of the Code of Iowa.

Section 3. Notwithstanding anything above to the contrary, the Bonds shall be issued initially as Depository Bonds, with one fully registered Bond for each maturity date, in principal amounts equal to the amount of principal maturing on each such date, and registered in the name of Cede & Co., as nominee for The Depository Trust Company, New York, New York ("DTC"). On original issue, the Bonds shall be deposited with DTC for the purpose of maintaining a book-entry system for recording the ownership interests of its participants and the transfer of those interests among its participants (the "Participants"). In the event that DTC determines not to continue to act as securities depository for the Bonds or the County determines not to continue the book-entry system for recording ownership interests in the Bonds with DTC, the County will discontinue the book-entry system with DTC. If the County does not select another qualified securities depository to replace DTC (or a successor depository) in order to continue a book-entry system, the County will register and deliver replacement Bonds in the form of fully registered certificates, in authorized denominations of \$5,000 or integral multiples of \$5,000, in accordance with instructions from Cede & Co., as nominee for DTC. In the event that the County identifies a qualified securities depository to replace DTC, the County will register and deliver replacement Bonds, fully registered in the name of such depository, or its nominee, in the denominations as set forth above, as reduced from time to time prior to maturity in connection with redemptions or retirements by call or payment, and in such event, such depository will then maintain the book-entry system for recording ownership interests in the Bonds.

Ownership interest in the Bonds may be purchased by or through Participants. Such Participants and the persons for whom they acquire interests in the Bonds as nominees will not receive certificated Bonds, but each such Participant will receive a credit balance in the records of DTC in the amount of such Participant's interest in the Bonds, which will be confirmed in accordance with DTC's standard procedures. Each such person for which a Participant has an interest in the Bonds, as nominee, may desire to make arrangements with such Participant to have all notices of redemption or other communications of the County to DTC, which may affect such person, forwarded in writing by such Participant and to have notification made of all interest payments.

The County will have no responsibility or obligation to such Participants or the persons for whom they act as nominees with respect to payment to or providing of notice for such Participants or the persons for whom they act as nominees.

As used herein, the term "Beneficial Owner" shall hereinafter be deemed to include the person for whom the Participant acquires an interest in the Bonds.

DTC will receive payments from the County, to be remitted by DTC to the Participants for subsequent disbursement to the Beneficial Owners. That each owner and each person in the possession or control of any lands in Benton County shall cut, burn or otherwise destroy all noxious weeds thereon, as defined in this chapter, at such times in each year and in such manner as shall prevent said weeds from blooming or coming to maturity, and shall keep said lands free from such growth of any other weeds as shall render the streets or highways adjoining said land unsafe for public travel. Noxious weeds shall be cut or otherwise destroyed on or before <u>May 1st, 2022</u> and as often thereafter as is necessary to prevent seed production:

That each owner and each person in the possession or control of any lands in Benton County infested with any of the following noxious weeds shall adopt a program of weed destruction described by the Weed Commissioner, which may be expected to destroy and will immediately keep under control such infestations of said noxious weeds.
 - (a) Primary Noxious Weeds: Quackgrass, Perennial Sowthistle, Canada Thistle, Bull Thistle, Musk Thistle, European Morning Glory or Field Bindweed, Horsenettle, Leafy Spurge, Perennial Peppergrass, Russian Knapweed, Buckthorn, Tall Thistle and all other species of thistles belonging in general of Cirsium and Carduus, Palmer Amaranth.
 - (b) Secondary Noxious Weeds: Butterprint, Cocklebur, Wild Mustard, Puncturevine, Teasel, Wild Carrot, Buckthorn Plantain, Sheep Sorrel, Sour Dock, Smooth Dock, Poison Hemlock, Wild Sunflower, Multiflora Rose and Shattercane

- 11. Inspections. Regular inspection will not be conducted.
- 12. The gate shall be purchased and installed by the County and maintained by the adjoining landowners. If not so maintained, the County may remove the gate.

- 1. The Owner, lessee, or person in lawful possession of any adjoining land.

The Supervisors took up discussion from the tabled action two weeks ago from the land use change application for Amana Farms, Inc. to build a fertilizer storage facility in Section 26 of Canton Township. At the original hearing on May 17, 2022, concerns that they hadn't heard from adjacent property owners. Greenlee prepared a written notice and that Amana Farms paid to have the sheriff's office physically serve it to the residence. In attendance today are neighboring property owners Al and Kay Welch and Nathan and Corley Welch. A letter from John Welch, co-owner to a neighboring property was read during the meeting. Welch wrote how he fully objected to the land use change and stating concerns about the truck traffic and the smell and noise generated from the loading and unloading of these tanks and how they would have a negative impact on mental health. Section 1. The amounts as shown, published, and approved in the County Budget for fiscal 2022/2023 on March 29, 2022, be and are itemized by service area to each department on the budgets filed in the office of the county auditor on July 1, 2022 are hereby appropriated. Federal and State grants and/or reimbursements expendable during the fiscal year are hereby appropriated to the designated departments or offices. For purposes of this resolution all departments relating to elections are considered one department. Further, the auditor is authorized to expend funds from the following budgets: Auditor, Elections, District Court, General Services, Non-departmental, GIS, Medical Examiner, Human Resources, and other budgets not under the specific authority of an elected official or full-time county official to ensure the day-to-day operations of the county.

Section 2. Subject to the provisions of other county procedures and regulations and applicable state law, the appropriations authorized under Section 1 shall constitute authorization for the department or officer listed to make expenditures or incur obligations, effective July 1, 2022.

Section 3. In accordance with Section 331.437, Code of Iowa, no department or officer shall expend or contract to expend any money or incur any liability, or enter into any contract, which by its terms involves the expenditure of money for any purpose in excess of the amounts appropriated pursuant to this resolution.

Section 4. If at any time during the 2022-2023 budget year the auditor shall ascertain that the available resources of a fund for that year will be less than said fund's total appropriations, she shall immediately so inform the Board and recommend appropriate corrective action.

Section 5. The auditor shall establish separate accounts for the appropriations authorized in Section 1, each of which account shall indicate the amount of the appropriation, the amounts charged thereto, and the unencumbered balance. The auditor shall report the status of such accounts to the applicable departments and officers at least quarterly during the 2021-2022 budget year.

Section 6. Tax Increment payments, which are subject to annual appropriation are authorized.

Section 7. All appropriations authorized pursuant to this resolution lapse at the end of the business day on June 21, 2022, for payment of goods and services received and/or performed as of that date. The board reserves the right to waive this date at its sole discretion for specific payments for the provision of goods and services that it deems should be paid within said fiscal year.

Section 8. Departmental appropriations remain in full force and effect through June 30, 2023, for payroll expenses occurring after the date stated in Section 7, for the final processing of expenses submitted on or before June 14, 2023, and for any expenses approved by the Board of Supervisors subsequent to June 20, 2023. All appropriations will lapse at the close of business June 30, 2023.

The time of 9:15 a.m. having arrived, and this being the time and date for a land use hearing for Amana Farms, Inc. for a part of the SE ¼ of the NE ¼ 31-83-10. John McGrath, representing Amana Farms was present along with numerous area landowners. Marc Greenlee presented the technical information with the Benton County Agricultural Land Use Preservation Ordinance. Amana Farms, Inc. would like to build a commercial fertilizer storage facility on 3-5 acres of land now owned by Steve and Scott Thompson. The storage tanks could potentially store 1 ½ million gallons of fertilizer. The plant supplying the fertilizer is in operation year-round, so storage is needed during winter months. This land is now currently in production. The portion was a concrete plant and borrow plant for the lowa DOT during construction of the HWY 30 and 218 interchange. The soils were disrupted in that process but were put back upon the completion of the project. The corn suitability rating of a 68. Surrounding land use is mainly row crop farming, with a few residences also in the area. There is no plan for water or sewer on the site. There is a current farm field entrance off a dirt road that meets requirements. Area landowners have contacted Greenlee with their opinions, and concerns of the business and also the road concerns and the materials in the tanks. Greenlee also read a report from the county engineer on expected truck traffic and maintenance of that Level B Road, particularly winter months. Most Benton County dirt roads have only minimal maintenance performed on them and ditches are very shallow and don't allow the moisture to drain out well. Engineer

Myron Parizek was also present for the discussion and explained the impact of having the roadbed lower than the fields and tile lines. It would take a ballpark expense of \$100,000to improve the road, and typically property owners would pick up half of the expense.

Board Chairman Seeman asked McGrath to explain to the crowd more in-depth what the plan was. McGrath explained how the fertilizer is made and stored. Its product is fairly well proven and in demand. They were looking for a place to expand and felt Benton County and along Highway 30 would be a good spot. Landowner Richard Less asked McGrath about the height of the structure and how he wouldn't like this view out his front door nor the odor it produces. Justin Nolan, another landowner asked the board why they previously denied a request on a different site and adding that he didn't feel we needed it in this area. McGrath was also asked about the track record and yield history using this product and the concerns of the unknowns what it could do to future production. What was the value their company could provide Benton County? Currently we have other companies in the area like Farm Service, Tama-Benton Coop and Nutrient that already employ Benton County residents. McGrath stressed how they wanted to provide a much more affordable fertilizer source and also addressed the odor concern and agreed there is an odor after application but how depending on the circumstances of weather and such it wouldn't be noticeable after 10-14 days.

Kate Robertson, Benton Development Group Director explained how Amana Farms, Inc. has been searching over a year and this is an investment into the county for growth and more job creation. Gary Bierschenk told Marc Greenlee he did a good job preparing for the hearing today. Supervisor Seeman addressed the room explaining how he would like to do some more research and table action and also allow a full vote from all three supervisors since Primmer was absent.

28E AGREEMENT FOR VICTIM WITNESS COORDINATOR/SEXUAL ASSAULT RESPONSE TEAM ASSISTANT

This 28E Agreement is made on this 19th day of July, 2022, by and between Benton County, Iowa, Buchanan County, Iowa, Clayton County, Iowa, Delaware County, Iowa, and Jones County, Iowa (hereinafter the Counties).

WHEREAS, all parties to this Agreement are public agencies as defined by Sections 28E.2 of the Code of Iowa;

WHEREAS, Iowa Code Chapter 915 provides for victims' rights in criminal proceedings, including registration and notification; and

WHEREAS, the Counties understand the importance of ensuring the presentation of rights and services to crime victims: and

WHEREAS, the Counties are committed to improving the services and support available to crime victims and witnesses; and

WHEREAS, the Counties recognize the importance of their Sexual Assault Response Teams (SART) in providing a victim-centered response in sexual assault crimes; and

WHEREAS, the Counties will cooperate in contracting with a multi-county Victim Witness Coordinator/SART Assistant to meet these needs; and

WHEREAS, through the resolutions adopted by the parties hereto, the provisions of this agreement have been approved by the parties.

Therefore, the parties agree as follows:

- PURPOSE: The purpose of this agreement is to allow the parties to share the services of a Victim Witness Coordinator/SART Assistant.
- TERM: This agreement is expected to last from July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023.
- 3. **ADMINISTRATOR:** No separate legal or administrative entity shall be established in order to administer this agreement. Clayton County is hereby designated as administrator for the joint or cooperative undertaking as required by Section 28E.6.
- 4. **FINANCING:** The manner of financing the joint or cooperative undertaking and establishing and maintaining a budget therefore, shall rest with Clayton County, Iowa.
 - a. Clayton County, Delaware County, and Jones County are utilizing the Victim Witness Coordinator and SART Assistant roles. Clayton County and Delaware County will each be responsible for \$13,000.
 Jones County will be responsible for \$13,780
 - b. Buchanan County and Benton County will be utilizing the SART Assistant and not the Victim Witness

- Coordinator services in their counties. These counties will each be responsible for \$6,500.
- c. Each county shall make payment in full to Clayton County Auditor by August 1, 2022.
- d. The Counties shall cooperate in applying for and obtaining any federal, state, or other funds to meet the financial obligations under this agreement.
- 5. SCOPE OF WORK: The Victim Witness Coordinator/SART Assistant is an independent contractor. Each county will be responsible for determining the scope of work for the Victim Witness Coordinator/SART Assistant in its county. This work may include, but is not limited to, providing criminal justice services to crime victims and witnesses, and leading and coordinating the activities of a county's SART. Each county will determine if the Victim Witness Coordinator/SART Assistant is required to submit time management sheets.

6 TERMINATION

- a. This agreement may be terminated at any time by a majority vote of the Counties. Any funds paid to the Clayton County Auditor that have not been earned by the VWC Coordinator/SART Assistant at the time of the termination of this agreement shall be returned to the Counties.
- b. A county withdrawing with cause must serve written notice upon the Counties at least 30 days prior to its withdrawal date. Notice may be sent by regular or by certified mail, return receipt requested. The withdrawing county must fulfill its financial obligations up to the withdrawal date. "With cause" may include the material breach of the terms or obligations of this Agreement by another county, and/or the failure of the VWC Coordinator/SART Assistant to fulfill his/her duties as established by the Counties.
- c. Any county may withdraw from this agreement without cause by serving written notice upon the Counties by April 1st. Notice may be sent by regular or by certified mail, return receipt requested. A party withdrawing under this subsection must fulfill its financial obligations under this agreement through the end of the fiscal year in which notice is provided.
- 7. AMENDMENTS: Any amendments must be in writing and approved by all parties to this agreement.
- SEVERABILITY: If any one or more of the provisions of this agreement are declared unconstitutional or contrary to the law, the validity of the remainder thereof shall not be thereby affected.

It was tabled from Tuesday, July 12, 2022. Marc Greenlee provided a recap of the technical information presented at that meeting along with the main concerns heard from the public. Since that meeting, the Supervisors did go on a tour with John McGrath of Amana to a few of their sites. Two of the storage bins and one field that had recently had the fertilizer applied. Amana Farms, Inc. would like to build a commercial fertilizer storage facility on 3-5 acres of land now owned by Steve and Scott Thompson. They haul away and land apply some of their effluent stream from that manufacturing process. The stream qualifies as a liquid fertilizer by the State of lowa and is regulated by the state. This site has been used by the lowa Department of Transportation for a concrete plant and borrow pit for the overpass project. The Corn Suitability Rating of the land is 68. Benton County works to protect farmland with a rating of 70 and higher. The county is required to notify anyone within 500 feet of a proposed land use change. Four adjacent property owners were previously notified. This land is next to a Level B Road, which would be difficult to maintain in winter months.

Supervisor Primmer thanked the board for tabling the July 12th agenda item so that he could be present. Seeman shared that yes, there is an odor, but it was not overpowering and also referring to a field they visited where the fertilizer was applied. Primmer added that he didn't find the odor "objectionable. Bierschenk was also impressed with the lack of smell and impressed with the condition of the sites, how they were all clean and well cared for.

lowa House File 2512 and 2477 were passed around to be shared, and the board wondered if Benton County even has a say in the matter, or if they will be superseded by the State of Iowa. This raised some legal questions regarding agricultural or commercial uses.

The board turned it over to John McGrath to explain plans for the expanding operation. He shared how fertilizer needs to be stored in winter months, since it can't be applied to frozen ground. There will be an odor when the tank is filled or emptied. That could last 5 to 10 days. They have been handling this product since 2008 and the Amana area since 2016.

They use it for 9,000 acres and they thought HWY 30 would be a good location to be off of. Brad Buchanan, Crop Tech Services, Inc gave some background and talked on the good quality of the fertilizer. They have been using the recycled product over 20 years in surrounding counties. Supervisor Primmer questioned Thompson about the price of fertilizer and how this will be divided out between them and the surrounding farmers. Landowner Steve Thompson also pointed out the economic benefit, with the cost and he felt his farms could use half and the rest available to others. The County Assessor was present to speak up on the value of these tanks if they are assessed as commercial or agricultural. Continued discussion was had back and forth with numerous residents who attended the meeting to voice their concerns. Concerns mainly being the odor, road conditions, and the disruption of the views of the nearby homes. Tim Sage, stating he was present in support, saying the county needs economic development. It also gives farmers another option for fertilizer. The tax base needs to be larger and to stop giving this business the run-around. Jill Bridgewater asked about how many jobs this would provide, with McGrath answering that there would be trucking jobs. Supervisor Primmer continued with regards to the smell, that there is no county ordinance to prohibiting this. Greenlee added that the State of Iowa doesn't regulate it either. Primmer added that the way the ordinance reads now, he didn't know how the board could deny this request. Seeman wanted a legal opinion, and didn't want to cause a riff in the community. Kate Robertson, Benton Development Group asked if Benton County was open for business. That this is a large investment into the county. McGrath also adding that this facility needs to be built before the ground freezes. Primmer agreed to not want to string out the matter. Bierschenk moved/Primmer seconded: To table action until they could talk to legal counsel on the matter. Motion

The time of 9:15 a.m. having arrived, and this being the time and date for the continued land use hearing for Amana Farms, Inc. for a part of the SE ½ of the NE ½ 31-83-10. It has been tabled 2 weeks in a row. The first time was so they could visit the storage facilities located in lowa County. Most recently because they had questions about how the state law affects the county's authority in this. No representation for Amana Farms was present. There were 3 concerned residents in attendance. Marc Greenlee, Land Use Administrator provided a brief recap. He addressed the state law that was in question last week and relayed what he heard from the Benton County Attorney in those regards. Greenlee said the Amana Farms project is subject to Benton County's land use ordinance. The material that Amana Farms wants to bring into the county is a byproduct of a manufacturing plant, not an agricultural byproduct. Supervisor Seeman said he talked with John McGrath of Amana Farms. They were willing to bring their product into Benton County after the beans are harvested and apply it to the field. Then everyone can see how it's going to be. If the odor isn't so overpowering, everyone in the neighborhood could get along. Seeman did agree that Amana Farms meets all of the criteria to put a tank there. Benton County has to have a good reason to deny other than the smell. A neighbor questioned what determines what is "overpowering" regarding the smell, and also said she had concerns about the truck traffic this will cause. Supervisor Bierschenk said he was confused why Amana Farms didn't want to build in lowa, Linn or Poweshiek County. It would make sense to me for them to continue to build more tanks in lowa County.

Seeman made a motion to table this, and Bierschenk seconded. Primmer asked if there was a timeframe on this or if the board was going to keep pushing it down the road. Adding that Amana Farms has gone through all of the hoops the board has asked of them, and smell and sight are not a part of the ordinance. Seeman said this is tabled until its brought up again. Voting aye were Seeman and Bierschenk, Primmer voting nay. Motion carried.

No action was taken, the Board wanted time to digest and research more on the subject.
