This led to discussion on reserves in the fund balances and how it is important to not utilize that if we can help it. The 3% cap on increases is still a concern this year as it was last year. If the county has valuation growth, and estimating same levies as last year and that amount is above 3% we are forced to lower the levy as we were forced to do last year. Supervisor Tippett would like to see the Board take a different approach this year. With his experiences as both the sheriff and police chief in the past. He would like to give department heads an amount to work with but not allowing cuts to wages, personnel or benefits. Auditor Rippel would get some documentation to the Board, so they can see the history over the past few years. The upcoming meetings will have a lot of discussion/action items that will need to be had before we can really start crunching numbers.

Tippett, Seeman and Volz all voting aye. Motion carried.

Tracey Achenbach with the East Central Iowa Housing Trust Fund presented the FY26 budget request. She explained how the trust fund started in the late 1990s. Since the program started, they have spent over \$1.2 million. The request of \$5,986 is an increase from \$5,387 last year. The supervisors agreed that the county gets a good return on this investment. \$183,080.00 was paid out in Benton County alone last year from the Eastern Iowa Housing Trust Fund.

Ryan Bervin with Assured Partners met with the board regarding employee benefits and the various renewal options through ISAC (lowa State Association of Counties). He said 28 counties participate in this partial self-funded health plan. The overall pool had a very good year. He explained the wellness, dental, life, vision and other benefits. He said the county's reserves are in a good spot. Bervin also touched on how an HRA works for sick leave conversion. It would be a great benefit to employees, but costly for the County. At this time, there was nothing set up for this. He can prepare more information about this and other things the board inquired on such as long-term disability.

Joe Kaiser, representing Stoney Arch Estates Association. He would like to see the easement removed between lots 10 and 11. He had concern about heavy farm equipment on that easement. Barb Fetzer of the land use department explained to Kaiser that the Supervisors can't do that, there would need to be a re-plat of lots 10 and 11 and that the City of Vinton would have the right to review. Kaiser thanked the Board for their time and will pursue further action.

Mark Erickson, Transportation Director, asked for clarification on the Transportation handbook regarding the Christmas Eve Holiday. His handbook still reflected a half day and his department worked a half day. Erickson was going to allow those employees 4 hours of comp time to reflect this and the Board agreed it was acceptable. This led to conversation to simplify the handbook(s) so that it is all one version with noting specific things to this department such as the Transportation's Drug and Alcohol Policy.

Tippett moved/Volz seconded: To authorize Mark Erickson to order both of the transportation bus(s) and commit funds accordingly over the FY 26 and FY 27 budgets. Tippett, Seeman and Volz voting aye. Motion carried.

Legislation in July changed and dissolved the compensation board, explained Auditor Hayley Rippel explained how legislation in July changed and dissolved the Compensation Boards. Reinstating the compensation board is up to the counties. In the past the Compensation Board sets the percentage recommendation to the Board of Supervisors. The Board then could not go above, they could cut, but would have to cut evenly across all officials. If they don't reinstate the Board, then the Supervisors would have to act as such, and do the work to show and justify where they got the amounts.

Assistant County Attorney Derek Marsh said Lough wanted the board to know he didn't think the county needs a compensation board, adding, "He feels like

we're perfectly capable to advocate for ourselves and our own people."

Supervisor Volz asked some questions how this affects all employees and Rippel explained the comp board is only acting for elected officials, which then trickles down to their respective deputy positions in their office and those wages can not go above 85% of their elected official's salary.

Supervisor Tippett observed the compensation board doesn't streamline the process, but it gives elected officials time to allow for a representative to advocate for the elected officials. Volz commented how nobody likes to see themselves asking for their own raise. Supervisor Seeman is on the fence, and said it would be another meeting to attend. Supervisor Tippett spoke on behalf of a previous meeting held by the elected officials and all but one were in favor of having it re-instated.

Tippett moved/Volz seconded: To approve Resolution #25-3, Re-Establishing a County Compensation Board. Tippett, Seeman and Volz voting aye. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION #25-3 RE-ESTABLISHING A COUNTY COMPENSATION BOARD

WHEREAS, pursuant to Iowa Code Section 331.905, as amended in 2024 by Senate File 2442, the county board of supervisors may vote to establish a county compensation board.

WHEREAS, pursuant to this same Code Section, when the board of supervisors establishes a county compensation board, the compensation board shall be comprised of seven members who are residents of the county. Two members shall be appointed by the board of supervisors, one member each by the county auditor, county attorney, county recorder, county treasurer, and county sheriff. The members of the county compensation board shall not be officers or employees of the state or a political subdivision of the state and shall serve staggered terms.

WHEREAS, the duration for the initial staggered terms for members of the County Compensation Board to run based on the election years of the County Auditor, County Attorney, County Recorder, County Treasurer, and County Sheriff. The two Board of Supervisor members will serve staggered alternating terms from each other.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, Benton County hereby establishes a county compensation board for the county.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, Benton County directs each of the elected officials to submit their respective appointments to the board of supervisors by January 14, 2025.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the representatives of the County Supervisors (1 of 2), County Auditor and County Sheriff shall serve an initial term of four years and the representatives of County Supervisors (2 of 2), County Treasurer, County Recorder and County Attorney shall serve an initial term of two years.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, this resolution shall apply retroactively to July 1, 2024.

They leverage state and federal resources for the region and kick into high gear when needed for such things as derecho disasters. Kurt also presented their annual report and Fiscal Budget asking of \$18,260.

Alyssa Comer and Mary Beth Stevenson, also from ECICOG came to educate the Board on the watershed management authority for the Middle Cedar. The authority has been in effect for 10 years. Benton County was the previous fiscal agent, and Tracy Seeman has served on the Middle Cedar Board. They are currently working on getting more entities signed on along with efforts to get a new coordinator hired. They are requesting \$5,000 from Benton County. IN the group are Franklin, Hardin, Butler, Grundy, Marshall, Tama, Black Hawk, Buchanan and Linn Counties along with smaller towns of Vinton, Traer, and Grundy Center and also the City of Cedar Rapids. Waterloo and Cedar Falls.

Melody Kosobucki with Riverview Center gave a quick overview of the services they provide in Benton County. They work to get people on path to healing and moving forward after being impacted by sexual abuse. They work closely with our Sheriff office and local hospitals. Their FY 25 Budget asking is \$1,000.

Karey Chase, vice president of community impact for the East-Central United Way talked to the Board about the volunteer center in Benton County. They currently have two part-time staff in their office space in Belle Plaine. Their advisory council would like to see them looking into server smaller communities. Chase explained what services they have provided such as transportation services and errand running, projects of coats, pillows and the tree of sharing and Thanksgiving food packages. Their FY 26 Budget asking is \$20.000.

Rik Handler, representing Pete's Hills Addition and Haley McNulty, representing Southern Exposure Estates came to present a petition of names and to discuss a paving project on 32nd Avenue from HWY 30 to the sub-division. The list of property owners are all willing to partner with Benton County for the cost of getting this done. Engineer Myron Parizek talked about the costs and time process of how soon this could take place. A contractor would have to be hired. The Engineer and Auditor will prepare a petition, contract and waiver to finalize the details of cost for doing this as a special assessment. The time span of how many years to spread this out was also discussed. This will be brought to the board at a later date for official action.

The Benton County Library Association met with the Board on their budget requests. The Association hasn't met with the board for some years and thought this was a great time with two new supervisor members. Kelly Henkle, The Vinton Library Director explained all the services they provide to the member libraries of Belle Plaine, Keystone, Blairstown, Norway, Atkins, Newhall, Shellsburg, Vinton, Van Horne and Garrison. They also provide services to Luzerne and rural residents of the County. They are asking the same amount as the current year. Henkle also talked about the programs put on in the libraries, and subscriptions, circulation and programming provided at each library.

Sheriff Dave Upah and Deputy Josh Karsten presented needs for an amendment to the current budget. It appears they will be short on spending authority in wage area and vehicles. Currently they are short four people and stressed this isn't for new positions, this was to fill vacancies where they have been short. With that comes the need for the vehicles and full gear to be put into the vehicles including in car camera systems. Auditor Rippel felt that these vehicles could be paid out of Local Option Sales and Service Fund (LOSST). She has included some of these increased spending authority in the upcoming Budget Amendment notice that recently went to the paper. That budget hearing is set for February 4, 2025 at 9:30 a.m. The 3 most recent vehicle purchases will be used for the new hires, and they are going to seek bids for 3 more that will be used to replace high0milease vehicles. Further discussion on amounts and also the need to increase the fees for contract rates. They would like to get something in place and sent out to the cities so that these new rates could go into effect July 1. The current rate is \$32.50 and that doesn't even cover the wages.

Robert Spangler, Phil Borleske and of the Benton County Historical Preservation Commission presented their FY 26 Budget request of \$17,135. \$6,000 is for office space rental and the rest goes towards training and projects they are required to do. The office space is to allow for these things and currently they share with the supervisors conference room and they want space of their own. The Supervisors told them they are still brainstorming for space and might know more by July.

Sheriff Upah reported that notice has been given to those cities that contract for law enforcement, that the rate increased. So far, he felt everyone has been receptive of it. Upah also reported the front steps that are broken in front of the law enforcement center and will need to be looked at and fixed for safety concerns.

Auditor Rippel reported that there has been numerous counties recently adjusting their budgets to pay one or more of their sheriff deputies salary out of the Rural Services fund instead of General Basic. The Board agreed to have the Auditor adjust things using the amounts of 2 deputies salary and provide them reports before they make a final decision on this. Rippel would get them some revised reports in regards.

Courtney Long, Veterans Affairs Director discussed care of graves and how Benton County pays \$5 per grave each year. Long also provided a list of veterans buried in Benton County along with invoices paid. Code section 35B.17 has been repealed, so nothing in the law that would require to continue said payments. The Board agreed to leave it the same. Long also answered some questions in regards to the Veterans Affairs and General Assistance Budget. The board suggested increasing the care of graves from the \$1500 asking to \$3000 as it was in the past years. Supervisor Seeman also suggested creating a possible form to keep log of the care provided to the graves.

Engineer Myron Parizek came to discuss some details for the 32nd Ave. Sealcoat project. He is planning to put this expense in his FY26 Budget. The last sealcoat project the county did had a 3% interest rate. With 41 participants, this would be one of the largest for this type of project the county has done. Typically the overall cost is split 50/50 between the county and property owners. RESOLUTION WAGES AND BENEFITS FOR PART-TIME EMPLOYEES IN THE BENTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE

Part-time Correctional Officers, Part-time Communications Specialists, Part-time Food Service/Custodian, Part-time Office Secretaries, and Part-time and Reserve Deputies.

WHEREAS, the Benton County Board of Supervisors adopted Resolution #24-52 on May 14th, 2024;

WHEREAS, the Benton County Sheriff has requested that the Resolution be revised to clarify the language and terms related to starting wages and wage growths for part-time Sheriff's Office employees, ensuring a consistent and equitable pay scale for the future.

WHEREAS, the terms "union contract" or "union agreement" refer to the most current master contract negotiated between the Benton County Sheriff's Office and Chauffeurs, Teamsters & Helpers Local No. 238, an affiliate of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, Chauffeurs & Helpers of America.

WHEREAS, all part-time Sheriff's Office employees are non-union members and observe the Benton County employee handbook pertaining to part-time employees;

WHEREAS, Reserve Deputies are regarded as part-time county employees and non-union members;

WHEEAS, in accordance with the Benton County employee handbook "Definition of Employee Status", Chapter 3.1, part-time employees are non-temporary employees scheduled to work less than 37 ½ or 40 hours per week dependent upon job classification or hired to work up to 40 hours per week on a seasonal basis;

WHEREAS, the Benton County Board of Supervisors believes that establishing wages and benefits for said employees is necessary to provide for the efficient operations of the department through the hire and retention of qualified employees;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the following policies are amended accordingly and adopted for the part-time employees in the Benton County Sheriff's Office:

- 1. Currently employed part-time employee wages will not be reduced and considered "grandfathered in", effective this date.
- All part-time and Reserve Deputies, that are recognized as state certified by the Iowa Law Enforcement Academy Council, will now be consolidated and classified as Utility Deputies, establishing a force of Reserve Peace Officers in accordance with Iowa Code 80D.1.
 - a. A Reserve Deputy is a Peace Officer if they are under the direction of a regular Peace Officer, and shall be vested with the same rights, privileges, obligations, and duties as any other Peace Officer. The Patrol Division Captain is the direct supervisor for Utility Deputies.
 - b. The job specifications for Utility Deputies are in accordance with terms outlined in the union contract.
 - Full-time Utility Deputies remain in this job classification. Full-time Utility Deputies are union members and follow union contract pay scale rates.
 - d. All Utility Deputies will be state certified Peace Officers recognized by the academy and will maintain training standards as outlined in Iowa Code 80D.3.
 - e. Newly hired Reserve Deputy training, for both certified and non-certified, will be in accordance with the Iowa Law Enforcement Academy rules and Iowa Code section 80D.3 training standards.
 - i. The Benton County Sheriff's Office will cover the cost of a non-certified Reserve Deputy's training course, as required by academy rules. However, the non-certified Reserve Deputy will volunteer their time to complete the course. Additionally, the Reserve Deputy will volunteer their time to complete the required weapons training course as outlined in 80D. Once these training and weapons courses are completed, the Reserve Deputy will begin a field training program at the Benton County Sheriff's Office, which will consist of at least 80 hours of on-the-job training. During this period, the Reserve Deputy will be compensated at their designated classification rate of pay per hour.

- ii. A newly hired state-certified Reserve Deputy will begin a field training program at the Benton County Sheriff's Office, consisting of at least 80 hours of on-the-job training. During this time, the Reserve Deputy will be paid at their designated classification rate per hour.
- f. Any job classification pertaining to "county security officer", "security guard", or "security officer" is abolished effective this date.
- 3. Part-time starting wages per hour and future wage growths:
 - a. Part-time wages will initially match the starting wage rate in the current 2024-2025 union contract, aligning with the first-year wages for full-time employees in their respective job classifications, as outlined below:

Utility Deputy: \$28.32 per hour Communication Specialist: \$21.92 per hour Correctional Officer: \$21.92 per hour Office Secretary: \$21.58 per hour Food Service/Custodian: \$19.51 per hour

- b. Part-time employees, being non-union members, gain no benefits defined in the union contract other than what is listed in sections 7 and 8 of this resolution, and are not eligible for years of service step increases outlined in the union contract.
- c. Step raises for part-time Sheriff's Office employees will increase by an amount corresponding to the county's annual pay rate adjustment, as determined by the Compensation Board and Board of Supervisors, defined in the county handbook.
- d. After July 1, 2025, part-time starting hourly wages will be aligned with the current wages of part-time employees in their respective job classifications at that present time.
- 4. Moving from part-time to full-time status:
 - a. Any part-time employee advancing to a full-time position, with the same job classification, shall start at the first-year wage for that job classification set by the union agreement.
 - b. Any part-time employee advancing to a full-time position, and the job classification is new or different from their current job classification, shall start at the first-year wage for that job classification set by the union agreement.
 - c. Part-time employment will not be used for seniority, years of service step increases, or calculations of any other type of benefits for employees going from part-time to full-time.
 - d. Any full-time employee moving to part-time status will start at the hourly wages aligned with the current wages of part-time employees in their respective job classifications at that present time.
- 5. Part-time Sheriff's Office employees shall receive compensation at the rate of 1.5 times their regular hourly pay for hours worked on a holiday, or for each hour worked in excess of 40 hours per week.
 - For the purposes of this section, holidays are defined as outlined in the most recent Benton County employee handbook. However, for Sheriff's Office employees, holidays will only be observed on the designated calendar holiday.
- 6. Part-time employees are not entitled to longevity pay.
- 7. Part-time employees shall receive a \$0.50 per hour shift differential for night shifts worked after successful completion of training. A night shift, for purposes of this section, is as defined in the most current union contract.
- 8. Part-time employees shall receive a \$0.75 per hour shift differential for weekend shifts worked after successful completion of training. A weekend shift, for purposes of this section, is defined in the most current union contract.
- Newly hired part-time employees are subject to a probationary period of 180 days, aligning with probationary periods outlined in the union contract.

Chairman Seeman opened up the public hearing for the FY 26 Proposed Tax Levy. Seeman asked Auditor Rippel to start out by helping explain the recent notice that went out to taxpayers. Rippel explained the differences between assessed and taxable valuation, and how the state applied rollbacks effect different classifications of values. The amount of valuation growth in the county affects the general basic and rural basic levies. The legislature has forced the county to reduce both of these levies due to the growth in the county wide valuations, which was over the 2% allowed amount. The County is always working in three calendar years at once. Current tax collection is based on the 2023 Values. FY 26 Budget is based off of the 2024 valuations. The Assessor is now also sending out the 2025 Assessments which will be utilized for the FY 27 Budget. These are assessment increases, not tax dollar increases. We realize this is all confusing, and this is one of those unfunded mandates passed down to the county level to do this mailing so close to the Assessment notices and it can be confusing. The total levy the county collects tax dollars for is not only the county's dollars, but various other levying entities. The dollars are disbursed to the cities, schools, fire districts, townships, Ag Extension, E911, EMA and Assessor. All of these entities make up the consolidated tax levy's that are applied to individual tax statements based on their taxing districts.

A room full of concerned taxpayers attended the meeting to express concerns over the impact of the proposed tax levy's. Some key points raised included:

The increased financial burdens put on residents. Requests for justification of budget increases, which led to salary discussion. Suggestions for cost-cutting measures instead of raising taxes along with questions raised about how the funds would be allocated and whether efficiencies could be found.

The Board members addressed some of these concerns by explaining funding priorities and statutory obligations and any potential adjustments that could be made. The citizens also asked that the Board share more information as to where the budgeted dollars are going along with explaining where they would be making cuts and improvements to be cost saving to taxpayers. Auditor Rippel explained how the required publication sums everything into Service Areas for expenditures and Revenues. The full 15 page budget will get posted on the website once we are ready to propose it and set the public hearing date. This will break it down more by those service areas with more detailed explanation and by fund. In conclusion to the public hearing, the consensus is for the future to hold these tax/budget hearings in the evening when more people area able to attend. There was also the request to have all county officials present at these hearings to answer questions that pertain to their department. After no further discussion. Chairman Seeman closed the public hearing. No action was needed at this time.

He explained what the advocate does and how it is important to have these people to follow up on services. Lough would like to find her a place in the county instead of working out of her home, so was talking to Grace Schmidt to see about placing her under the Public Health Department. Lough would be meeting with the County's Public Health Board on this next week. Mental health is a big issue not only in our county, but every county.

Lough also discussed the need for a county-wide training coordinator and would like to assign that duty to his Assistant Attorney. Alisha Stach-Lorang has an emphasis on law enforcement and could be a benefit. Lough mentioned training in areas such as being in a courtroom in a contested trial, help them prepare to be ready. Along with other things such as search warrants or the mandatory arrest requirements. Lough added he would like to fund the additional \$5,000 for salary and \$2,500 for supplies and things needed for the trainings for the next 2 years to come out of the Attorney's collection incentive fund.

A joint meeting between the Board of Supervisors and the EMS Advisory Council met on April 1, 2025 at 6:08 p.m. at the EOC at the Sheriff's Office. Supervisor Seeman, Tippett and Volz were all three in attendance.

The Emergency Medical Services Advisory Council has been meeting monthly over the past year to focus on ensuring the EMS tax dollars are being utilized properly and distributed equitably among the service providers.

Assistant County Attorney Derek Marsh was invited to join and provide some legal background and explained how establishing some procedures to help on being more compliant. This is still a new service state wide and more and more counties are trying to get it passed. Marsh also mentioned how things could change yearly on how this is supposed to operate. Most recently learning that Salaries and wages may now be included in the approved uses. Marsh has been working with Auditor Rippel to help define a list of approved uses along with reporting and reimbursement procedures along with the possibility of creating some 28E agreements with the outside agencies for mutual aid.

Debate was had how to fairly distribute the revenue to EMS agencies along with including those out of the county services who assist in responding to calls within Benton County. Considering factors were: population served, call volumes and geographical coverage. Identifying the underserved areas and determining how funding could help improve response times and coverage was a lengthy discussion. The calls per service amount of \$300 was brought up again after previous meetings. This might be too big of an amount referring to what a normal call gets paid after the billing process, it is around \$225. Ben Darling, representing Blairstown Ambulance Service explained how the transports are legally able to bill for services. Some calls they donate time and supplies and don't get reimbursement. The clock starts once that ambulance starts transporting the patient. This was an eye opener to the non EMS providers present. Anna DeMuth, North Benton Ambulance Director invited the Supervisors to take the time and go around and meet with some of the services one on one and ask questions along with listening to the concerns and here how they all operate.

Anna Demuth shared a handout for homework for all entities to take the time and fill out. Demuth would like the history over the past few years on statistics for calls and assists. This could help with the determination if they decide to pay out on a per call basis in the future. The council will skip a month and meet again in June. For the time being, proceed as we have been by submitting claims to the Auditor's office with the required forms and invoices.

Mae Hintgen, Chief Executive Officer of the MHDS of the East Central Region provided an update to the Board regarding the upcoming transitional plan that will go into effect after July 1, 2025. A service from Des Moines was chosen to cover the entire state for mental health and substance abuse. They will no longer be dividing that into regions as we currently are, but will now be the re-organized districts created. The priority will still be getting people the services they need and to make them accessible. They will be committed to be a good transitional partner and get information out during this time. Further discussion about the positions that will no longer be funded by the region was also had. This has been an emotional time for all involved.

Engineer Myron Parizek presented his proposed 2025 Dust Control Prices. He bases this on material and labor costs as best as possible. Last year it was \$1500 for the first 400 feet and he is asking for that to increase to \$1550. Parizek reported last year there were 140 different sites who participated in the dust control, but also mentioned that residents can also choose to hire outside contractors for their applications. Contractors will do it for profit while the county does it per cost. Benton County isn't required to offer this. The Board agreed as long as the equipment works for this to continue, although would revisit it if things start needing replaced. In years past, County also requested some roads that was recommended to seal coat and what we provide or continue to do so. We don't charge for administration costs such as permits.

Eric Franzenburg met with the board to discuss how he would like to start a shrimp farm. He currently has a diversified farm operation, growing different crops like fruits, vegetables, flowers and herbs. The past five years they have started a agri-tourism project called the "Sunflower Experience." This farm is located off HWY 30. Regarding the County's land use ordinance and what is defined as agricultural activity was discussed in depth. Franzenburg said there is a concern that shrimp is not considered an animal of agricultural activity. He presented information about this and that it is a viable operation being developed in the state. People will be able to just eat shrimp that is produced locally instead of coming from another state or China. Franzenburg also emphasized tourism, and how he plans tours of the facility to educate people on why to buy shrimp from a farm.

Supervisor Seeman asked if they would be able to use Poweshiek water, and they can but would need to add salt to make the environment ready. It takes about 3 months before they would be ready to sell.

Supervisor Volz asked if there would be any bi-product to dispose of. There would be about 10 gallons of water a day, but no manure management plan needed in this type of operation. There is already an existing driveway.

Barb Fetzer, Benton County Land Use office explained that if Franzenburg wanted to split this area off like he has expressed, if it is less than 21 acres, it would not meet the definition of a farm. She agreed that this is an ag use, but stressed the definition of farm under the ordinance

Steven Beck, Belle Plaine City Manager, spoke how Franzenburg's are an asset to the community. Beck inquired about getting a new 911 address for this area and wants to be sure there is a pathway for this going forward.

The time of 9:15 a.m. having arrived, and this being the time and date set for a land use hearing for Destructible Ink of the SE ¼ of the NE 1/4 Section 12-86-11. The owner of the land in is Farmtastic 3,LLC. which consists of Mark Kotouc, Wade Hennings and Dustin Schirm. There were about 50 members of the public present, along with Destructible Ink representatives and Mark Kotouc. Matt Even presented the technical information with the Benton County Agricultural Land Use Preservation Ordinance. Even stated the applicants would like to change the use of 28 acres to allow for a wind turbine blade recycling and storage facility. This site is located in Cedar Township, approximately 2 miles northeast of Mt. Auburn. It was previously a chicken/egg farm and is currently being used as a storage facility. This ground has a CSR of 64 and not considered high quality farm ground. This property is surrounded by row crops on all sides with dwellings located immediately northeast and southeast of the property. There is an existing driveway and was reported by secondary roads that it conforms to county policies. The previous septic system that was for the former egg farm was properly abandoned in 2017. If any existing or new plumbing fixtures are utilized, a private sewage disposal system will need to be installed. There are two private water wells in place currently. Legal notices were sent out to adjacent property owners published in the papers. Benton County Environmental Health and Land Use Department has received several inquiries regarding potential environmental hazards and permitting, so they contacted the DNR. If blades will be cut up in an outdoor space, the area must be covered by an NPDES General Permit 1 to allow the discharge of stormwater from this area. The grinding process its typically covered by an air quality construction permit. Primary potential risks is from airborne particles, mainly composted of fiberglass dust, carbon fiber dust and epoxy resin particles. Other issues include microplastic pollution and potential fire hazards.

Even explained the major goal the people of Benton County hoped to achieve when creating the land use plan was to protect agricultural land in the county. Other goals included providing for the orderly growth of urban, industrial and agricultural lands so that they develop in harmony with each other and to encourage the development of the commercial and industrial businesses in defined areas of the county. Land use decisions based solely on the economic system can easily lead to incompatible uses. According to the compatibility of the land uses table within this plan, heavy industrial is incompatible with agricultural and residential rural areas. This adversely affects a third party; be it an individual, or society as a whole. These effects often lead to economic hardship, or most often a decline in property value. This proposal is not consistent with the preservation of agricultural land and orderly development. There are serious concerns about this proposal's effects. These conditions for approval have not been met, and it is recommended by the Environmental Health and Land Use staff to deny for this reason.

At this time, Jared Sanford along with Cody Earle, representatives from Destructible Ink were able to present by zoom and speak in person about the plans for their project. They said their company is focused on end of life solutions for renewable energy, specifically turbine blades. They are needing short term storage in a remote area. All of the shredding would occur inside with plenty of airflow.

They said it wouldn't affect the County Landfill. Earle explained that there would be approximately 8 trucks a day to haul the blades to this location. It would start in July and go through September. This brought up the conversation of why the need for short-term vs long-term storage. The board also opened up for public comments and questions. There were numerous concerns from nearby neighbors and farmers about the dust mitigation and the existing processing operations and commissioning for disposals of these blades. Most voiced environmental concerns and safety hazards along with the impact of the weight and added truck traffic on the county roads. They were asked how they could guarantee the dust particles wouldn't contaminate nearby grain bins and water streams that lead into the river. After a lengthy two hour discussion it was suggested by legal counsel to finish up the public comments.

Tippett moved/Volz seconded to close the public hearing at 11:09 a.m. Tippett, Seeman and Volz voting aye. Motion carried.

Tippett moved: To deny the request for the application for land use change as the proposed new non-agricultural use is inconsistent with the purpose of Ordinance 24. The proposed use is an incompatible use that could materially alter the stability of the overall land use pattern in the area. The proposed use would have no doubt impact adjacent property owners, whether that impact be in property values, farming operations, or overall enjoyment of the land. I do believe that these gentlemen will be successful in marketing their property, but I don't believe that this project is a good project for Benton County. Section 3. In accordance with Section 331.437, Code of lowa, no department or officer shall expend or contract to expend any money or incur any liability, or enter into any contract, which by its terms involves the expenditure of money for any purpose in excess of the amounts appropriated pursuant to this resolution.

Section 4. If at any time during the 2025-2026 budget year the auditor shall ascertain that the available resources of a fund for that year will be less than said fund's total appropriations, she shall immediately so inform the Board of Supervisors and recommend appropriate corrective action.

Section 5. The auditor shall establish separate accounts for the appropriations authorized in Section 1, each of which account shall indicate the amount of the appropriation, the amounts charged thereto, and the unencumbered balance. The auditor shall report the status of such accounts to the applicable departments and officers at least quarterly during the 2025-2026 budget year.

Section 6. Tax Increment payments, which are subject to annual appropriation are authorized.

Section 7. All appropriations authorized pursuant to this resolution lapse at the end of the business day on June 24, 2025, for payment of goods and services received and/or performed as of that date. The board reserves the right to waive this date at its sole discretion for specific payments for the provision of goods and services that it deems should be paid within said fiscal year.

Section 8. Departmental appropriations remain in full force and effect through June 30, 2026, for payroll expenses occurring after the date stated in Section 7, for the final processing of expenses submitted on or before June 17, 2026, and for any expenses approved by the Board of Supervisors subsequent to June 24, 2025. All appropriations will lapse at the close of business June 30, 2026.

The Region is asking for the MOU to cover a year but hoping they can get things done sooner. Tippett stated he wants to see the wages and benefits stay the same, but sees why the county would be concerned.

Public comment was made by Doug Cook, that as a citizen and tax payer of Benton County he was not in favor of this. as there was no incentive and could become a liability.

AGREEMENT FOR DETENTION SERVICES Pursuant to Iowa Code Chapter 28E

THIS AGREEMENT FOR DETENTION SERVICES ("Agreement") is made and entered into this _____ day of _____, 2025, ("Effective Date") by and between Benton County, Iowa, a governmental entity and political subdivision of the State of Iowa, acting by and through the Office of the Benton County Sheriff ("Benton County") and Polk County, Iowa, a governmental entity and political subdivision of the State of Iowa, acting by and through the Office of the Polk County Sheriff ("Polk County"), pursuant to Iowa Code Chapter 28E. Benton County and Polk County may hereinafter be referred to individually as "Party" and/or collectively as "Parties."

WHEREAS, the purpose of lowa Code Chapter 28E is to permit state and local governments in lowa to make efficient use of their powers by enabling them to provide joint services and facilities with other agencies and to cooperate in other ways of mutual advantage; and

NOW THEREFORE, the Parties do hereby agree as follows:

ARTICLE I - JOINT EXERCISE OF POWERS

A. Purpose: The purpose of this Agreement is to establish and memorialize the terms, duties and responsibilities of the Parties in which the Benton County Sheriff shall provide Benton County jail facilities, which meets the requirements of Chapter 356 of the Code of Iowa for the purposes of housing pretrial detained persons committed inmates, who would otherwise be detained in the Polk County Jail

ARTICLE II - TERM

A. This Agreement shall be effective upon its approval and execution by both Parties and its recording with the Secretary of State and shall expire on June 30, 2027, unless terminated earlier by either Party in accordance with Article IX of this Agreement. The Parties may upon mutual agreement renew the Term of his Agreement for an additional one (1) to three (3) year term.

ARTICLE III - FILIING

- A. Pursuant to Iowa Code section 28E.8 Polk County shall electronically file this Agreement with the Iowa Secretary of State, after the Parties have approved and executed this Agreement.
- B. Any amendment, modification, or termination of this Agreement will be filed by Polk County with the Iowa Secretary of State pursuant to Iowa Code section 28E.8

ARTICLE IV - ADMINISTRATION

A. Pursuant to Iowa Code section 28E.6, both the Polk County Sheriff and Benton County Sheriff shall each designate Administrators responsible for administering this joint Agreement.

ARTICLE V - DUTIES OF THE PARTIES

- A. POLK COUNTY
- 1. Polk County shall provide Benton County with notice and make prior arrangements before delivering detainees/inmates.
- Polk County shall provide all transportation of Polk County detainees/inmates confined in the Benton County jail facility which
 might be necessary for any reason, including but not limited to transportation to and from the Polk County and Benton County
 jail facilities.
- B. BENTON COUNTY
- Benton County shall provide safe and suitable jail facilities as defined in Chapter 356 of the Code of lowa, for all acceptable detainees/inmates who are lawfully committed to the charge and custody of the Polk County Sheriff and transportation to Benton County's jail facilities by Polk County.
- 2. Benton County shall have sole discretion in determining whether or not a prisoner is acceptable and shall not be obligated to accept detainees/inmates if Benton County determines it would cause exceptional circumstances to house the detainee/inmate in the Benton County jail facility.
- Benton County shall perform the duties and responsibilities of County Sheriff as keeper of the county jail facility as required by Chapter 356 of the Code of Iowa, with respect to detainees/inmates transported by Polk County.

ARTICLE VI - COMPENSATION

- A. Polk County shall pay Benton County the sum of \$60.00 per prisoner per day of detention. For the purposes of this paragraph, a day shall be deemed to be a 24-hour period commencing with the arrival of the detainee/inmate at the Benton County jail facility. Benton County shall be compensated at one-half the daily rate for a prisoner confined for less than four hours of any day and at the full daily rate for a prisoner confined for four (4) hours or more of any day.
- B. Polk County shall reimburse Benton County for any and all necessary medical expenses incurred by Benton County on behalf of Polk County's detainee/inmates.
- C. Benton County shall bill Polk County on a monthly basis for services provided pursuant to this Agreement by submitting an itemized statement of the Detention Services provided during the past month.

ARTICLE VII - CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION

- A. The Parties shall safeguard all confidential information, documents, records and reports as required by law including, but not limited to, Chapter 690 and 692 of the Code of Iowa.
- B. The Parties shall implement security processes and procedures to reasonably prevent unauthorized release or disclosure of confidential information.
- C. Benton County shall not further disclose or disseminate Protected Health Information and other confidential information obtained by Polk County and subsequently provided to the Benton, except as authorized pursuant to 45 CFR 164.512(g).

ARTICLE VIII - OPEN RECORDS AND MEDIA REQUESTS

A. The Parties shall communicate and coordinate on any and all open records request, pursuant to Iowa Code Chapter 22, so that both Parties comply with their respective legal obligations under the law.

ARTICLE IX - TERMINATION

- For Convenience.
 - 1. Either Party may terminate this Agreement at any time, with or without cause, by providing written notice to the other Party not less than thirty (30) days prior to the proposed termination date. The effective date of termination will occur thirty (30) days following receipt of written notice or upon a later termination date agreed upon by the Parties in writing.

ARTICLE XIV - INDEMNIFICATON

A. To the extent permitted by the Constitution and laws of the State of Iowa, the Parties shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless each other from and against any and all losses, costs, penalties, fines, damages, claims, demands, actions, expenses (including attorney's fees) or liabilities arising an individual Party's own acts, errors, omissions, or negligence in the performance of that Party's Duties under the terms of this Agreement or required by law. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed as a waiver of any governmental immunities available to the County, pursuant to Chapter 670 of the Code of Iowa, as it now exists or may be amended from time to time.

ARTICLE XV - MISCELLANEOUS

A. Entire Agreement

This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding and agreement between the Parties relating to the subject matter hereof and shall supersede (stand in place of) all prior or contemporaneous discussion(s), agreement(s), and representation(s) whether written or oral. It is understood and agreed that this Agreement incorporates and includes any and all prior negotiations, correspondence, conversations, agreements, or understandings applicable to the matters contained herein and the Parties agree that there are no commitments, agreements, or understandings concerning the subject matter of this Agreement that are not contained in this document. Accordingly, it is agreed that no deviation from the terms hereof shall be predicated upon any prior representation or agreements whether oral or written.

B. Headings/Captions

The section headings, subheadings, and captions contained in this Agreement are included for reference and convenience only and shall not enter into the interpretation of the Parties' obligations under this Agreement, nor limit or otherwise affect the terms of this Agreement.

C. Amendments

The terms and provisions of this Agreement may only be amended by the prior express written mutual consent of the Parties.

D. Counterparts / Execution

This Agreement or any written Amendments may be executed in multiple counterparts, each of which when so executed shall be deemed an original, but all of which, when taken together, shall constitute but one and the same Agreement/instrument. Any counterpart delivered by commercially available electronic means, including e-mail, electronic e-signature software or other electronic means shall have the same import and effect as original or manually signed (i.e., "wet-ink") counterparts and shall be valid, enforceable and binding for the purposes of this Agreement/Amendment.

E. Non-Assignment

The IOSME shall not assign its obligations or Duties under the terms of this Agreement without the prior express written consent of the County.

F. No Legal Entity

Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to create a new or separate legal or administrative entity, nor shall a joint board be created for the administration of this Agreement.

G. Severability

In the event any portion or provision of this Agreement or the application of any such provision to any Party or circumstances is determined to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable under applicable law: (1) this determination shall in no way affect the validity or enforcement of the remaining portions or provisions of this Agreement; and (2) the Parties shall negotiate in good faith to replace the unenforceable or invalid provision(s) by such as has the effect nearest to that of the provision being replaced. The remaining portions or provisions shall remain in full force and effect.

H. Waiver

The failure to exercise any right under this Agreement shall not be deemed to be a waiver of such right, and shall not affect the right to enforce each and every right hereof. The waiver of any breach of any term, provision, covenant or conditions of this Agreement, by any party hereto of its rights with respect to any matter arising in connection with this Agreement shall not be construed as a general waiver or a waiver of any other term or condition.

28E AGREEMENT FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT DISPATCH SERVICES Between the Benton County Sheriff's Office and the Cities of Belle Plaine, Vinton, and Urbana, Iowa Date: April 22, 2025

This Agreement is entered into pursuant to lowa Code Chapter 28E by and between the **Benton County Sheriff's Office** ("Sheriff's Office") and the **Cities of Belle Plaine**, **Vinton**, **and Urbana**, each of which operates a municipal law enforcement agency (collectively referred to as the "Cities").

I. Purpose

The purpose of this Agreement is to establish a cooperative arrangement in which the Benton County Sheriff's Office will provide centralized law enforcement dispatch services to the Cities of Belle Plaine, Vinton, and Urbana. This shared arrangement is designed to promote operational efficiency, equitable cost-sharing, and high-quality service delivery.

II. Duration

This Agreement shall commence on **July 1, 2025**, and shall remain in effect through **June 30, 2026**, unless terminated earlier as provided in Section VIII.

III. Scope of Services

The Sheriff's Office agrees to provide the following dispatch services to each participating City's police department:

- 24/7 radio dispatching and call routing
- Emergency and non-emergency call handling for law enforcement services
- Communication coordination among field units and support services
- · Access to and notifications via Iowa Systems, as applicable

IV. Payment and Cost Allocation

For Fiscal Year 2026, contract rates will remain unchanged. Each City agrees to pay the following annual and quarterly fees for dispatch services, effective July 1, 2025:

- City of Belle Plaine: \$18,200 annually / \$4,550 per quarter
- City of Vinton: \$26,500 annually / \$6,625 per quarter
- City of Urbana: \$9,287 annually / \$2,321.75 per quarter

Additionally, each City shall pay the full amount billed under the Quarterly lowa System Invoice.

All payments are due within 30 days of invoice receipt and shall be made payable to the Benton County Sheriff's Office.

V. Records and Call Tracking

The Sheriff's Office will maintain accurate records of dispatch activity by City, using ORI codes and Call for Service data. These records shall be available for review upon request and will inform future rate assessments and contract adjustments.

VI. Suspension or Dissolution of Local Law Enforcement

This Agreement remains valid only while each City maintains an active, operational police department. If a City disbands or suspends its law enforcement operations, its obligations under this Agreement will terminate as of the effective date of such change.

This **28E Agreement** is entered into pursuant to **lowa Code Chapter 28E**, by and among the following governmental entities, hereinafter referred to collectively as the "Parties":

- Vinton Police Department (VPD)
- Belle Plaine Police Department (BPPD)
- Urbana Police Department (UPD)
- Benton County Sheriff's Office (BCSO)

ARTICLE I - PURPOSE

The purpose of this Agreement is to establish a cooperative arrangement to jointly support and utilize a **Law Enforcement Mental Health Liaison** ("Liaison") to enhance mental health-related response, coordination, and intervention across Benton County.

ARTICLE II - DURATION

This Agreement shall commence on **July 1, 2025**, and terminate on **June 30, 2026**, unless earlier terminated in accordance with Article VIII. It may be renewed on an annual basis upon mutual written consent of the Parties.

ARTICLE III - ADMINISTRATION

The administration of this Agreement shall be conducted jointly by the participating entities. Oversight of the Liaison shall be provided by the **Benton County Sheriff's Office**, through its **Sheriff** and **Chief Deputy**. Each participating police department shall designate a point of contact for communication and coordination purposes.

ARTICLE IV - FUNDING AND COMPENSATION

The Liaison shall be employed by the **Benton County Sheriff's Office**, which shall be responsible for payroll, benefits, equipment, and administrative oversight. The salary for fiscal year 2026 is projected at **\$74,160**, with the following contributions:

Participating agencies shall remit their contributions quarterly, due on the first business day of each quarter: **July 1**, **October 1**, **January 1**, **and April 1**. All payments shall be made payable to the **Benton County Sheriff's Office**.

ARTICLE V - LIAISON DUTIES

The Liaison shall:

- Coordinate mental health crisis responses in conjunction with local law enforcement.
- · Assist in identifying and addressing mental health-related concerns.
- Refer individuals to appropriate services and resources.
- Deliver training to officers on de-escalation and mental health indicators.
- Support families and communities affected by crisis incidents.
- Maintain compliant records of all interactions in accordance with legal and privacy requirements.
- Collaborate with mental health professionals, service providers, and stakeholders.

ARTICLE VI - CONFIDENTIALITY

The Liaison shall maintain the confidentiality of all personal, medical, and law enforcement information in accordance with HIPAA, state laws, and all applicable federal regulations.

ARTICLE VII - MEETINGS AND EVALUATION

Participating agencies shall meet periodically to review program effectiveness, assess outcomes, and make recommendations regarding training, resource needs, and continued collaboration.

ARTICLE VIII - TERMINATION

Any party may terminate participation in this Agreement by providing **thirty (30) days written notice** to the other parties. If any agency ceases to maintain an active law enforcement department, its obligations under this Agreement shall be considered **null and void** as of the effective date of such dissolution.

ARTICLE IX - AMENDMENTS

This Agreement may be amended at any time through mutual written consent of all Parties.

ARTICLE X - FILING

This Agreement shall be filed with the lowa Secretary of State in compliance with lowa Code Section 28E.8.

Supervisors reported on recent committee meetings they attended. Tippett had a Board of Health meeting, reported that they have been busy with various activities and also have a few interns helping out. They will be coming to an upcoming supervisors meeting with an update on some of the short funding on a grant. Volz attended Heartland Insurance meeting and shared some handouts he received, one table showing Benton County coming in at the top for claims with vehicle damage mainly from deer and some workman's comp claims. Heartland will be hosting their fall seminar on September 11. Volz also added that there will be mock OSHA audits this fall also and some required training due to House File 706. The Sheriff employees are all doing their due diligence with these animal cases, no different than if it were humans. The "calls for service" all have a logged history from every call that comes in and dispatchers enter it into the system. It was agreed that this is just a start for making changes, and it might need to be slowed down and done correctly to allow for more input and time to research additional concerns. The 2nd reading is being held next week, so the Attorney's office will make some changes and make the new draft available. It was agreed that the protection of people is the number one goal and priority of the ordinance, although their needs to be responsibility stressed to be on the pet owners as well.

WHEREAS, the Benton County Board of Supervisors ("Board") adopted Resolution #12-36A, Establishing a Revolving Loan Fund and Parameters for Gifting Local Option Sales and Services Tax Money for Emergency Services Equipment on August 12, 2012; and

WHEREAS, the Board adopted Resolution #13-11, Amending Resolution #12-36A and Readopted Resolution #12-36A to include Benefited Fire Districts as those eligible to request funds; and

WHEREAS, the Board desires to repeal Resolutions #12-36A and #13-11; and

WHEREAS, the Board desires to re-establish a Revolving Loan Fund and Parameters for Gifting Local Option Sales and Services Tax Money for Emergency Services Equipment.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board to adopt the following:

- That the amount of funds received from the Local Option Sales and Services Tax (LOSST) for the purchase of emergency services equipment shall be determined by the Board of Supervisors on, at the minimum, an annual basis. The amount of LOSST to be dedicated for said purpose shall be at e sole discretion of the Benton County Board of Supervisors.
- Only townships or benefited fire districts may request funds on behalf of emergency service providers for the purchase of
 emergency service equipment from the Board of Supervisors. The requests shall be made in writing or at a board meeting of
 the Benton County Supervisors.
- 3. Emergency Service Equipment may include construction and equipping of facilities needed to house emergency service equipment.
- 4. All gifts and loans are limited to services providing direct emergency services to rural residents in Benton County, and excludes hospitals, doctor's offices, city facilities (other than fire stations, ambulance garages, etc.). The list of exclusions is not all-inclusive and the Board of Supervisor reserves all rights and authority to determine if an emergency provider meets the intent of this resolution.
- 5. Benton County may provide funds to emergency service providers whose principal domicile is outside of Benton County but who provides emergency services to Benton County rural residents. The provision of funds, if any, is at the sole discretion of the Board of Supervisors. The amount of funds may be reduced from the 10% depending on the number of residents and/or area served by said emergency service provider.
- 6. That the amount of said funds provided to townships, benefited fire districts and/or the townships' or benefited fire district's designee(s), may be in the form of a gift or loan at the sole discretion of the Board of Supervisors and contingent upon available funds.
- 7. Gifts to townships or benefited fire districts and/or their designee(s) shall not exceed 10% of the cost of the equipment.
- 8. Funds provided under this resolution may be paid directly to the organization providing the emergency services.
- 9. Terms of loans made pursuant to this resolution shall be as follows:
 - a. Amount of loans shall be determined and at the sole discretion of the Board of Supervisors
 - b. The interest rate shall be 1.5% above the current money market rate being paid to the county.
 - c. Loans are contingent upon the availability of funds allocated for said purpose.
 - d. Repayment schedule for loans shall be determined by the Board of Supervisors.
 - e. There will be no penalty for early re-payment.
 - f. Proceeds received from the repayment of loans shall be deposited into an interest-bearing special revenue fund. Said fund is to be used for future financing of emergency equipment requested by townships or benefited fire districts.
- 10. No application for gifts or loans shall be considered when the price of the item(s) in the application can be purchased in its entirety from other funds that were created by a Benton County Public Measure.
- 11. The Benton County Board of Supervisors retains all right to approve or deny any and all requests for gifts and/or loans, in part or in full.

PETITION, CONTRACT AND WAIVER

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into by and between Benton County, lowa (hereinafter referred to as the "County"), and the undersigned property owners (hereinafter referred to as the "Property Owners").

WHEREAS, the Property Owners are respectively the owners of the tracts of real estate set opposite their names; and

WHEREAS, the Property Owners desire that the public improvements described as macadam base/sealcoat improvements to portions of the secondary road along 32nd Avenue, from 75th Street north 1.5 miles, and 74th Street, from 32nd Avenue west 3000 feet, and 75th Street, from 32nd Avenue west 950 feet (hereinafter referred to as the "Project") be accomplished; and

WHEREAS, such construction will specifically benefit the respective property of the Property Owners; and

WHEREAS, the County has the power to accomplish the Project and assess a portion of the cost thereof to the Property Owners pursuant to Sections 331.485 and 331.486 of the Code of Iowa, by using the procedures set out in Chapter 384, Division IV of the Code of Iowa; and

WHEREAS, the total estimated cost of the project is \$855,000 and

Consents to the adoption of a preliminary resolution, a plat, schedule and cost estimate, and resolution of necessity by the County for the Project.

Waives any objections to the Project, the boundaries of the district, the costs of the Project, the assessment against any lot, or the final adoption of the resolution of necessity.

Agrees that the amount and proportion of the cost of the construction of the Project, as ascertained and determined by the Board of Supervisors of the County and set forth in the Final Schedule of Assessments to be prepared following completion of the construction of the Project and to be paid by the Property Owners, shall constitute assessments against the respective properties listed below.

Waives the notice to property owners by publication and mailing as provided by Section 384.60 of the Code of lowa (relating to notice of certification to County Treasurer of final schedule of assessments).

Agrees that said assessments shall be paid by the undersigned Property Owners either in cash without interest within 30 days after the Board of Supervisors has levied the assessments, or in not more than seven equal annual installments of principal plus accrued interest at the rate of 3% per annum.

Elwick's have stated that this is the 3rd time they have showed interest in the property. They are happy to see it is not suitable for conservation and glad its turned over to the Supervisors as there was no intent at all to honor any previous owners wishes for the property to be a wildlife refuge area. It was originally a school in Taylor Township. Mike Elwick more recently shared a letter that was distributed to the Board back in September and has visited with the Conservation Board, and the County Attorney's office in regards to their proposal, stemming back from 2015 when they offered an easement swap of the same amount of land, where no money would be exchanged. There is a waterline that goes across their field with no easement on record and that it needs to be addressed. October 7, says there was a waterline easement that should have been recorded back in 2007.

Willing to talk more, but wants to the county to keep the funds and not to go to the Conservation Board.

Derek Marsh, Assistant County Attorney responded that you can't swap easements for land rights. Easements are use rights per lowa Code. Marsh said this has not been used for wildlife refuge probably since 1952. The county had took quiet title action to the property and Marsh provided copies of the judge's paperwork and other documents to the Board. Marsh also mentioned the Marketable Record Title Act (MRTA) a piece of legislation adopted by states in the US to simplify and facilitate real property transactions. It was designed to eliminate older recorded real property interests that may interfere with future development or create potential liability for title insurance. Certain laws were enacted for property owners to protect their covenants and/or restrictions on a recurring basis through a recording requirement. When those requirements are not met, then the covenant and/or restriction could be non-binding on the land. Marsh also presented a certified copy of the land survey of the property along with a resolution from the City of Vinton regarding the Easement. This ultimately says the rights would continue to go from person to person. Furthermore if its all about the water, the City has Ordinances and this property is located within the city limits and Conservation has been paying utility bills. Continued discussion on the timelines in regards to the ownership and different uses of this property was had.

The Board declared this public hearing closed at 1:24 p.m.

Alyssa Comer, Grant Administrator through ECICOG provided the update. The CDBG Disaster Recovery Tree Replanting contract in the amount of \$750,000 was awarded to Benton County from the Iowa Economic Development Authority (IEDA) for removal of stumps and replanting of trees in the Atkins Roundhouse Area. A release of funds was issued on April 22, 2024. For the removal of stumps in the Atkins Roundhouse Area, a pre-construction meeting was held on November 18, 2024, work began on January 28, 2025, and was completed by March 27, 2025. For the replanting of trees in the Atkins Roundhouse Area, a pre-construction meeting was held on August 25, 2025, and planting began on October 8th, 2025. Work is ongoing.

For a summary of funding of the activity and source of funds, and a total funds spent thus far by source, as of October 20, 2025, a total of \$33,441.25 has been invoiced and paid for project delivery service and newspaper publications, and \$237,203.85 in project costs has been invoiced and paid, all using CDBG funds.

For a general description of remaining work, remaining work on the project is weekly watering, maintenance of land to support tree growth, and hand planting along the property line of the Atkins Roundhouse Area, as well as required monitoring and site visits conducted by the lowa Economic Development Authority (IEDA).

For a general description of changes made to the project budget, performance targets, activity schedules, project scope, location, objectives or beneficiaries, the project is currently on schedule to be completed before September 2026.

Shelby Williams, Conservation director reported that there have been 255 trees planted. They have about a year warranty if need any to be replanted.

After no further comments, the public hearing was closed with no action needed.

HANDBOOK POLICIES AND PROCEDURES RE: SICK LEAVE SECTION 4.3

SICK LEAVE 4.3

Regular full-time employees will accrue sick leave at the rate of 5.5 hours per 75/80-hour pay period. The maximum number of hours that an employee will be able to accrue is 750 hours for those employees whose normal workday is 8 hours. Should an employee go below 750/800 hours, they will again accrue at the rate of 5.5 hours per pay period. If in any pay period an employee used 37 ½ or 40 hours of sick leave or more; depending on the employee's normal work week, no sick leave will be earned for that pay period. Accumulated sick leave may be used for the following:

Illness, injury, medical, vision or dental appointments of employee, partner, parent or child. Sick leave may be used in ¼ hour increments, but a minimum of ½ hour must be used first.

It is the intent of Benton County to comply with Federal Family Medical Leave Act and its amendments. Employees should refer to Benton County's policy "Family Medical Leave".

Benton County Engineer Myron Parizek discussed a speed limit request he received regarding 70th Street in Van Horne. The City reached out to him about the road on the east side of town where it has annexed some ground and has a few new houses. There is currently a 35 mph for traffic entering town and a 55 mph exiting town. The City has requested the county have it be 45 mph both ways. This position will continue to be provided through Advanced Correctional Healthcare (ACH). This will help offset other expenses incurred from inmates who need Emergency room visits and other minor medical issues and qualifies under the use of the Opioid Funding. The jail has also found ways to get reimbursed for some of their medication needs through the ASO and have plans to also increase federal funding for the federal inmates. A brief overview of a few other projects were as such: Safe RX-for some locking pill boxes that will be distributed throughout the county to pharmacies and clinics. Virginia Gay Hospital (VGH) is sending 2 employees to CPI training, and those individuals can in return provide additional de-escalating training to others. VGH will also be opening up suboxone accessibility for individuals to get their help locally.

WHEREAS, the parties have agreed in writing to a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA), signed in November 2025.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Benton County Board of Supervisors that the Memorandum of Agreement between the Sheriff's Office and the Union is hereby approved, and the following changes to the Collective Bargaining Agreement shall take effect immediately:

Creation of New Article 28 – Promotable Position Differential

The following language shall be added to the CBA as Article 28:

Employees promoted to First Line Supervisor positions—defined as Patrol Division Sergeants, Corrections Division Sergeants, and Lead Communication Specialists in the Communications Division—shall receive an additional \$1.00 per hour for all hours worked.

Detectives, while not classified as First Line Supervisors, are designated as Specialized Promotable Positions and shall receive an additional \$1.00 per hour for all hours worked.

Employees in the promotable positions listed above shall not receive the additional \$1.00 per hour Training Pay referenced in Article 18.

Employees in these promotable positions shall not receive retroactive pay for this differential. The additional \$1.00 per hour shall begin on the date of Board approval of this Resolution.

Patrol Division Sergeants and Detectives are classified as promotable positions through the Civil Service Commission. Corrections Division Sergeants and Lead Communication Specialists are designated as promotable positions within the Benton County Sheriff's Office but are not subject to Civil Service procedures.

2. Renumbering Articles:

The previous Article 28 (Duration of Agreement) shall hereafter be designated Article 29 – Duration of Agreement.

3. Full Force and Effect:

Except as amended by this Resolution and the accompanying MOA, all other terms of the Collective Bargaining Agreement remain in full force and effect.

The time of 9:30 a.m. was set for a Public Hearing on Amending the FY 26 Budget. The board opened up the hearing. Auditor Rippel explained the various areas where the additional spending authority was needed along with some offsetting revenues. Rippel handed out spreadsheet that reflects the journal entries to be made after all was approved. Various entities such as EMS, ARPA and OPIOID funds needed the spending authority from added revenues or carryover from prior FY. Sheriff's added position to the jail and IPERS Rate changes was also reflected. The Juvenile Detention Budget continues to be costly to the county along with juvenile transports and also Pioneer cemetery had previously been granted an amendment so this reflects that amount as well. The public was able to ask questions and look at the reports as well. After no further discussion, the public hearing was closed.
